


THIS FALL, PLANT A TREE!

Fall is a great time to plant trees when the rains begin in the Pacific Northwest. In fact, the City of Seattle celebrates Arbor Day in October because this is the best time of year to plant trees. When looking for a place to plant a tree, look up, down and around. That cute little Douglas Fir tree may grow to 80' tall. If you have the space for a big tree, big trees have many benefits like increased stormwater uptake.

SAFETY TIP FROM THE FIELD

Fall storms sometimes lead to downed power lines. If you see a power line on the ground, always assume it is electrified. Stay at least 20 feet away and call 911.

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
