In response to concern following the homophobic act of terrorism at Pulse nightclub in Orlando on Sunday, June 12, the Office of Film + Music + Special Events is partnering with Officer Jeff Geoghagan of the Seattle Police Department to present two Active Shooter Trainings catered to the needs of event organizers and nightlife professionals.



The trainings will outline strategies and cover best practices to help individuals working in nightclubs, music venues, bars, and at large-scale events, learn how to protect themselves, their staff, and their patrons, from potentially deadly acts of gun violence. It saddens us that trainings like this are a necessary part of doing business, and we hope attendees never need to use these skills, but preparing now could save lives. 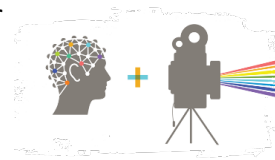
The Landmarks Preservation Board has unanimously approved the Admiral Theater's renovation plans. Theater operator Sol Baron is proposing limited exterior improvements, updated restrooms, and expanding from two to four screens, with the two large auditoriums housing around 220 seats. The board's approval allows the plans to proceed, as the Admiral Theater is protected historic site which limits any drastic changes to the structure.
