Why have Restricted Parking Zones (RPZs)?

- Curbspace is a limited public resource
- Balance and prioritize competing needs



RPZ Program

- What are RPZs designed to do?
 - Limit long-term, commuter parking
 - Allow short-term parking for visitors
 - Prioritize residential parking access



RPZ Program

- What are RPZs designed to do?
 - Limit long-term, commuter parking
 - Allow short-term parking for visitors
 - Prioritize residential parking access
- RPZs **do not**:
 - Differentiate between types of residents
 - Guarantee or reserve anyone a parking space in the public right of way



How do RPZs work?

- Permits exempt residents from time limit
- Most other vehicles subject to 2-hour time limit
- 4 decal permits per household
- 1 guest permit per household
- \$65/permit for two years
- Income eligible permit available



Why have an RPZ in the Junction?

- Request from JuNO
- Better manage parking
- Parking study and community feedback

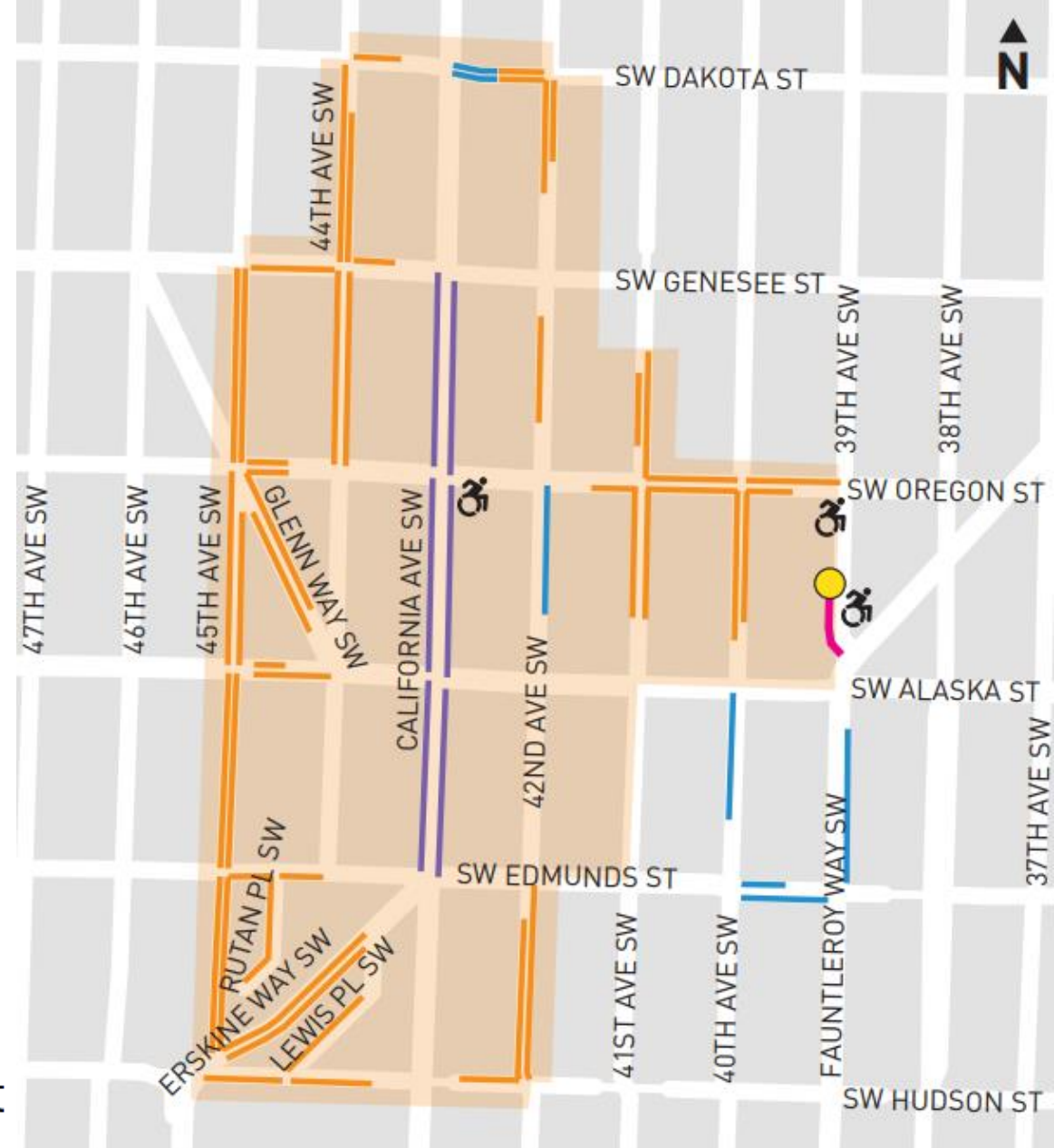
- Proposed RPZ signed blocks

Individual Parking Space Changes

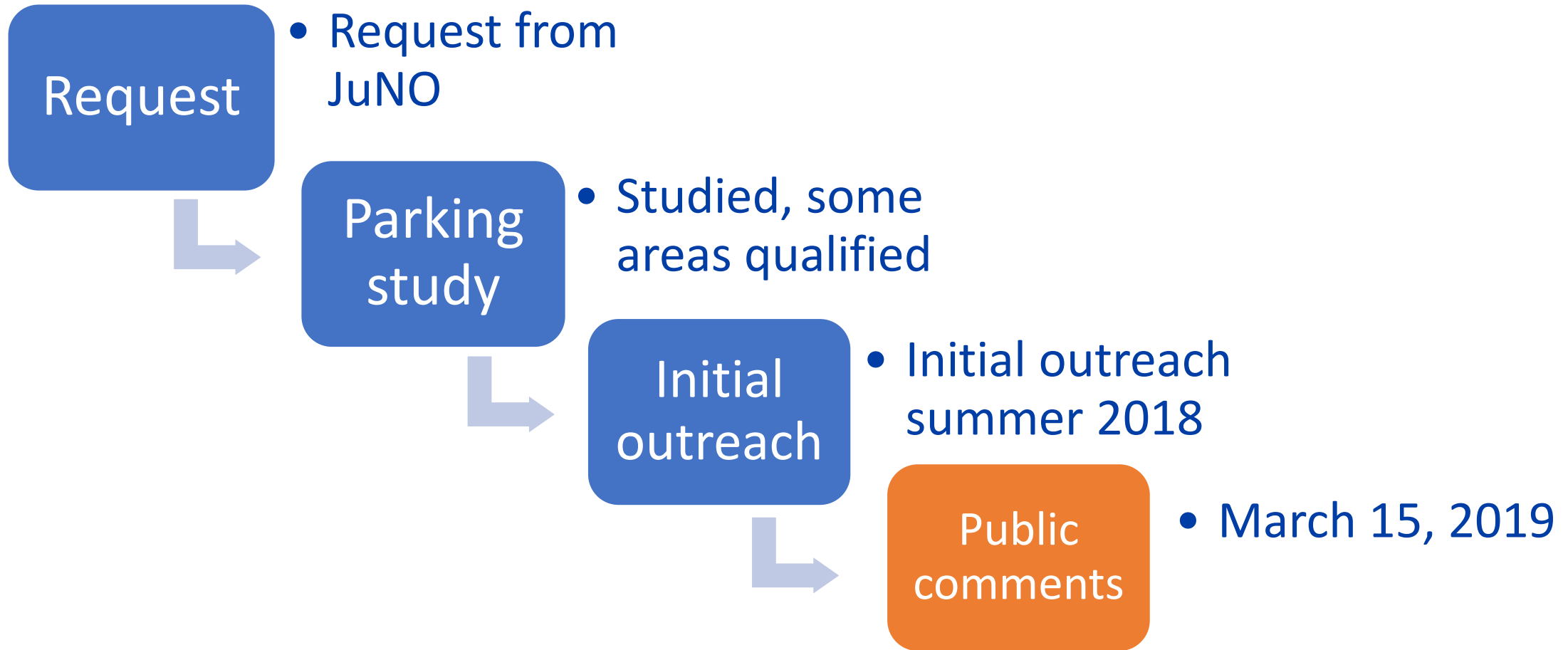
- ♿ Disabled space - 4-hour limit
- Load zone

New Unpaid Time Limits

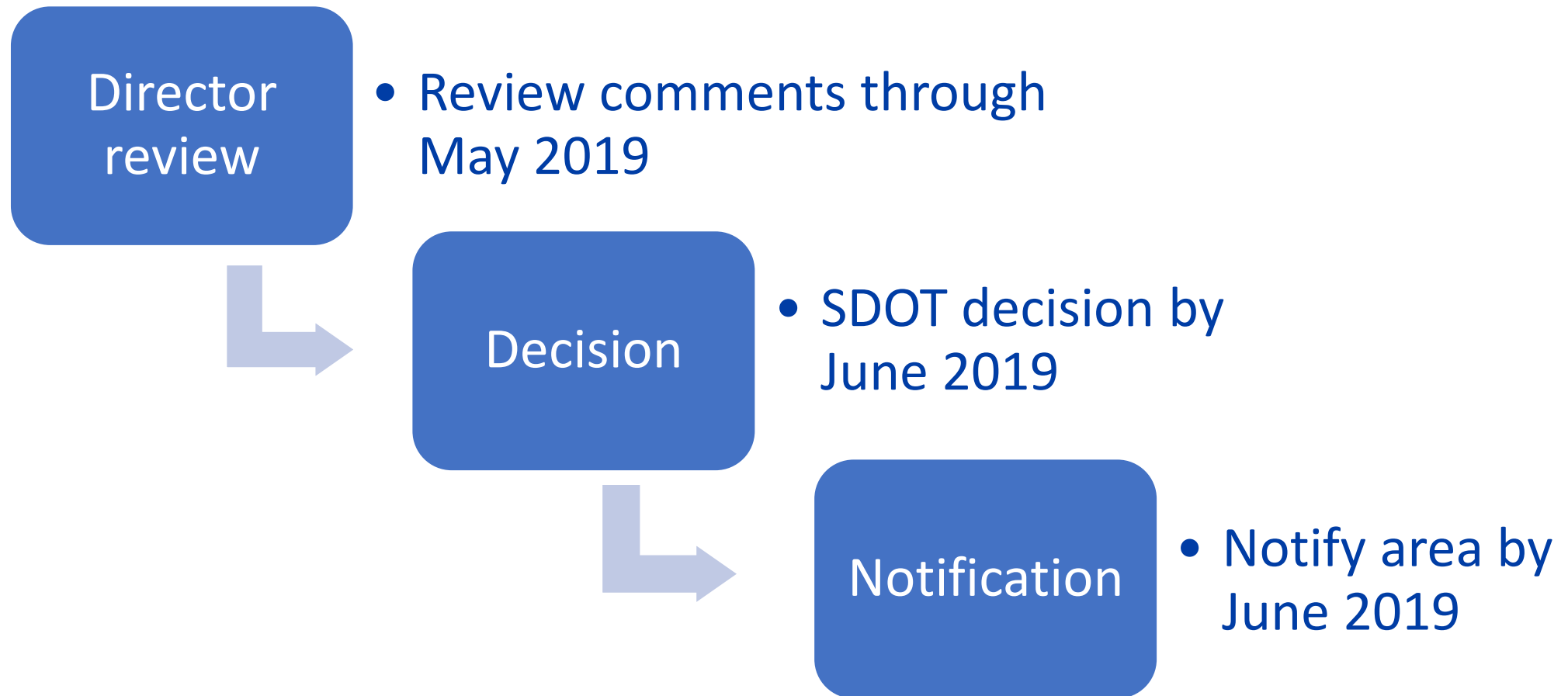
- 2-hour time limit
- 4-hour time limit
- Extend 2-hour time limits to 8 PM Mon - Sat

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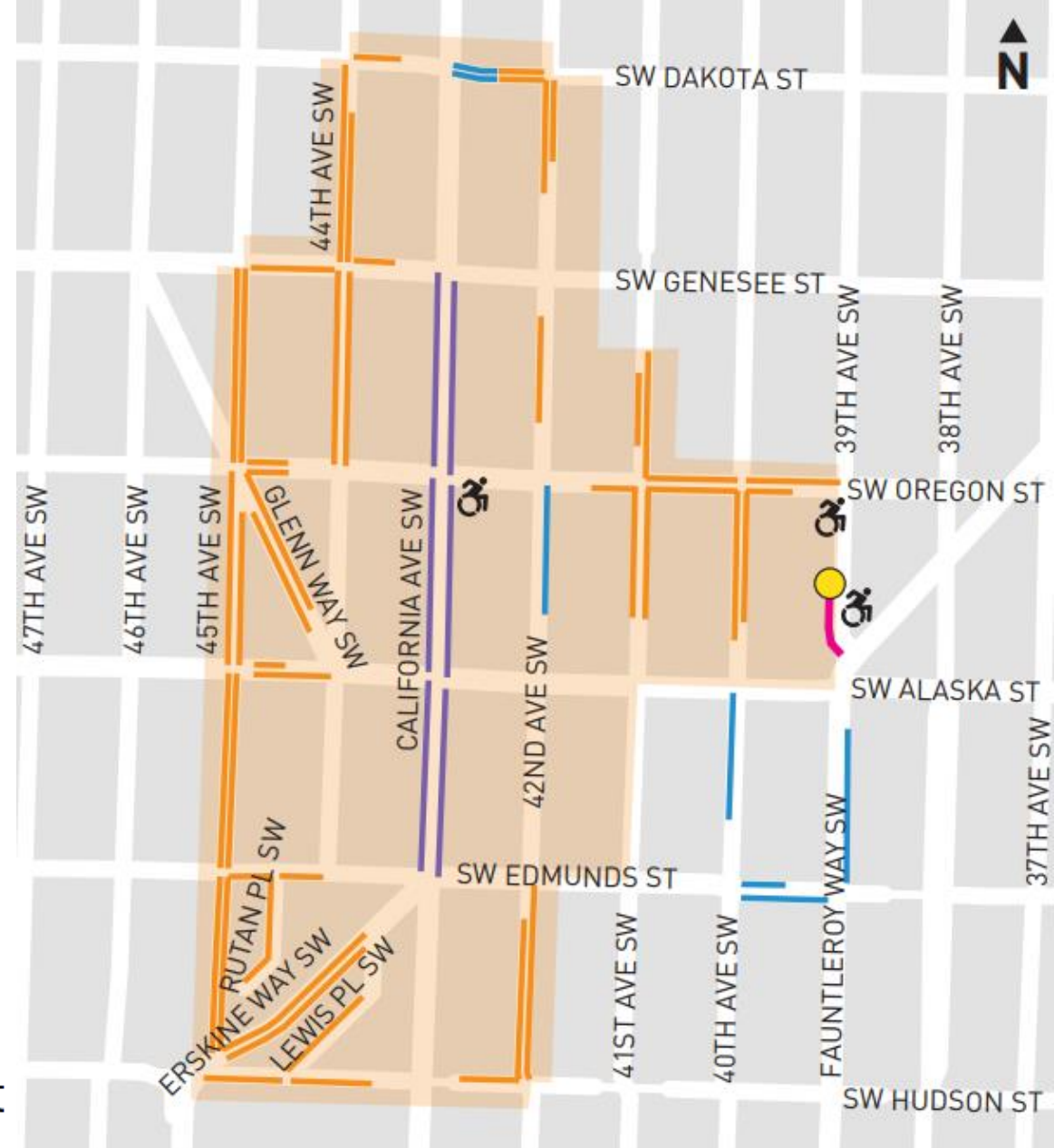
