The City of Seattle is committed to being a safe, vibrant, interconnected, and affordable city.

Week Overview

Week three brought a new round of changes in the Senate. On January 24, Senator Ericksen (R) announced he would likely leave his seat in May to take a position in Washington, DC, under President Trump. Until May, Ericksen plans to spend time between Washington State and Washington, D.C., to transition into his new role. Senator Dansel (R) also announced his immediate resignation to take a role in the Trump administration. Rep. Short (R) will run to be appointed to Dansel's vacated Senate seat.

Until Dansel's replacement is appointed, we will be working with an equally divided Senate (24 Democrats and 24 members of the Republican-controlled Majority Coalition Caucus). Majority Floor Leader, Senator Fain (R), announced there would be no Senate floor sessions until Dansel's vacancy is filled. If this process is done expediently, his appointed could occur as early as February 6.

On Thursday, Council President Harrell visited the Legislature to meet with key legislators and discuss the City's legislative agenda, specifically focusing on homelessness, education, transportation, and deadly force issues.

On Friday, the Senate Democrats attempted to change the Senate's procedural rules to allow a floor vote on a bill addressing the levy cliff. The Senate Democrats hoped the Lt. Governor would rule that a majority of members present in the Senate could change the Senate rules. However, after much debate, Lt. Governor Habib ruled that they needed a majority of the 49 members to do so. The Democrats then tried to temporarily suspend all of the Senate's rules, but Sen. Mullet (D) had already left for home, there was no longer a 25-member quorum present. In the end, the Senate adjourned until January 28th at 10 am.

Priority Areas

Education

Education Funding Plan: On January 27th, the Senate Republicans released their education funding plan. The plan would implement a new, flat statewide property tax of \$1.80 per \$1,000 of assessed value in replacement of the varying levy rates between school districts; allow for school districts to raise additional, voter approved revenue at a levy authority cap of 10 percent starting in 2020; add an additional \$1.4 billion for education funding per biennium without new revenue; eliminate the current teacher salary grid; increase the minimum beginning teacher salary to \$45,000 per year, and offer a housing allowance of up to \$10,000 for high cost of living school districts; eliminate the current funding model and replace with a minimum of \$12,500 per student model; repeal I-1351; and include a referendum clause bringing this plan to the voters for approval. This [draft](#) plan will be heard in the Senate Ways and Means Committee on Monday, January 30th.

Levy Cliff: [SHB 1059](#) passed the House on January 23rd with a 62-35 margin. On January 27th, the Senate Democrats attempted to pull SB 1059 to the Senate floor for a vote, however the effort failed after Lt. Governor Cyrus Habib ruled against the efforts. SHB 1059 has been scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Ways and Means Committee on Monday, January 30th.

Outdoor Preschools: [SB 5357](#), sponsored by Sen. Ranker (D), establishes a pilot program to license outdoor early learning and child care programs. SB 5357 is scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Early Learning & K-12 Education Committee on February 2nd.

Public Safety

Death Penalty: Sen. Miloscia (R) sponsored [SB 5354](#), which abolishes the state's death penalty. The bill has not been scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Law and Justice committee.

Use of Deadly Force: The Senate and House will be holding public hearings on several use of deadly force bills this week. [SB 5073/](#)[HB 1529](#) adopts recommendations approved by the state task force, which deletes the good faith and malice clauses in favor of a new standard that asks if a "reasonable officer" would use deadly force in the same circumstances. Both bills also contain policy aimed at funding new training techniques, like de-escalation practices, distribution of less-lethal weapons and data collection on use of force incidents.

Rep. Goodman (D) introduced [HB 1769](#), which supports law enforcement's efforts to implement the recommendations of the state task force on the use of deadly force in community policing. This includes establishing funding to: assist agencies in obtaining less-lethal weapons, requiring data collection on incidents involving deadly force or great bodily harm, creating a program for correction officer and inmate and public safety, establishing community engagement programs,

establishes a law enforcement diversity study, and creating enhanced law enforcement leadership training.

In addition, Sen. Pearson (R) introduced [SB 5429](#), which aims to reduce the number of violent interactions between law enforcement officers and members of the public and creates and updates training programs focusing on de-escalation and community engagement.

Sexual Assault Forensic Exams: [HB 1109](#), which creates a pilot project to create and train multidisciplinary community response teams, and creates a funding account using a fee levied on adult entertainment establishments, was passed out the House Public Safety committee and was referred to the House Appropriations committee. In addition, [HB 1111](#), which creates procedural improvements to the collection and processing of DNA, received a public hearing on January 23rd in the House Public Safety committee.

Human Trafficking: [SB 5029](#), which protects victims by creating a protection order or no-contact order, received a public hearing on January 17th and is scheduled for executive action on February 1st. The House companion bill, [HB 1079](#), was passed out of the House Public Safety committee on January 19th, and is in the House Rules committee awaiting further action. [HB 1078/SB 5030](#), which extends the statute of limitations for human trafficking crimes from three to ten years, have been passed out of their committees and are now in the House and Senate Rules committees awaiting further action.

Gun Responsibility: Attorney General Request legislation introduced by Rep. Jinkins (D) and Sen. Frockt (D), [HB 1387/SB 5444](#), will require enhanced background checks for those wishing to purchase an assault weapon. This includes raising the age of purchase to 21, a search of local and federal criminal and mental health databases, and required safety training. The house bill is scheduled for a hearing in the House Judiciary committee on February 2nd. In addition, [HB 1122/SB 5463](#), dangerous access prevention, creates criminal liability if a child or anyone prohibited from possessing firearms accesses an unsecured firearm and uses it to hurt themselves or others. The House bill is scheduled for a public hearing on February 2nd and the Senate bill is yet to be scheduled for a public hearing.

Legislation banning the sales of assault-style rifles ([SB 5050/HB 1134](#)) have not been scheduled for public hearings.

Police Citizenship: [HB 1182](#), sponsored by Rep. Stokesbary (R), which addresses civil service qualifications for police officers, fire departments, and county sheriff departments by expanding who can apply for a position to include a lawful permanent resident, received a public hearing in the House Labor and Workforce Standards on January 24th and is scheduled for executive session on January 30th. The companion bill, [SB 5389](#), sponsored by Sen. Miloscia (R), has not been scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate.

Marijuana: [HB 1065](#), sponsored by Rep. Kirby (D), which would reduce the penalties for possession and transfer of marijuana products outside of the I-502 system in certain circumstances and authorize the noncommercial transfer (gift) of marijuana products in amounts equal to half of the current possession limits by a person 21 years of age or older to another

person(s) 21 years of age or older, is scheduled for executive action in the House Commerce and Gaming Committee on February 2nd. [HB 1260](#), sponsored by Rep. Fitzgibbon (D), would require a court to vacate misdemeanor marijuana possession convictions on request of a qualifying applicant. The bill received a public hearing in the House Public Safety Committee on January 23rd, and Kelly Harris from the City Attorney's office testified in support of the bill.

[HB 1712](#), sponsored by Rep. Sawyer (D), would allow marijuana retailers to seek an endorsement from the Liquor Cannabis Board (LCB) to deliver marijuana products to those 21 years of age or older. The bill has not been scheduled for a hearing.

Ban the Box: [HB 1298](#), sponsored by Rep. Ortiz-Self (D), would prohibit employers from asking about arrests or convictions before an applicant is determined otherwise qualified for a position. The bill received a public hearing on January 24th, and is scheduled for executive action on January 30th in the House Labor and Workplace Standards Committee. [SB 5312](#), sponsored by Sen. Baumgartner (R), is a similar bill, and is scheduled for a public hearing on February 1st in the Senate Commerce, Labor, and Sports Committee.

Public Records: [HB 1317](#), introduced by Rep. McBride (D) and Rep. Nealey (R), concerning the public disclosure of global positioning system data corresponding to residential addresses of public employees and volunteers, will receive a public hearing on January 31st in the House State Government, Elections, and Information Technology Committee. Additionally, it has already been scheduled for an executive session on Feb. 1st.

General Government

Seattle Center: Rep. Fey (D) introduced [HB 1114](#), which exempts the Seattle Center and Tacoma Dome from the leasehold excise tax. This bill received a public hearing on January 27th and Tom Israel, Seattle Center Finance Director, testified in support of the bill.

Environment

Airport Environmental Impacts: [HB 1171](#), sponsored by Rep. Orwall (D), would direct for the completion of a study of certain environmental impacts, including ultrafine particulate emissions, associated with aircraft traffic in areas impacted by airport operations. HB 1171 received a public hearing in the House Environment Committee on January 24th. The Senate companion bill, [SB 5225](#), sponsored by Sen. Keiser (D), is scheduled for a public hearing on February 1st in the Senate Energy, Environment, and Telecommunications Committee.

Medicine Stewardship: [HB 1047](#), sponsored by Rep. Peterson (D), received a public hearing on January 24th. This bill would require manufacturers to operate a drug take-back program to collect and dispose of prescription and over-the-counter drugs from residential sources.

Paint Stewardship: [HB 1376](#), sponsored by Rep. Peterson (D), received a public hearing on January 26th, and has been scheduled for executive action on February 2nd. HB 1376 would

require producers of architectural paint to participate in a stewardship program for managing disposal of leftover paint.

Homelessness & Housing

Homelessness: [HB 1570](#), deals with access to homeless housing and assistance, eliminates the sunset for the local homeless housing and assistance document recording fee, and increases the \$40 fee to \$90. The legislation also changes the definition of private rental housing to include non-profit organizations. The bill received a public hearing on January 26th, and Robin Koskey, Seattle Office of Housing, as well as many community members testified in support of the bill.

Youth Homelessness: Rep. Slatter (D) introduced Department of Commerce request legislation, [HB 1630](#), which would allow unaccompanied minors aged 13-18 to consent to share personally identifying information under Washington’s Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). The Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) is used by state and federally funded homeless and housing service providers to collect and manage data gathered during the course of providing housing assistance to people experiencing homelessness and to households at-risk of losing their housing. HMIS data is used in a number of ways: to streamline referrals and coordinate case management; track client outcomes; prepare financial and programmatic reports; understand the extent and scope of homelessness; identify service gaps; and to inform system design and policy decisions. The HMIS compliance rate is also used as a criterion for awarding federal funds. Washington State’s HMIS informed consent privacy standards require HMIS participants to “opt in” to the HMIS system by signing a form.

Preservation Tax Exemption: Sen. Fain (R) introduced [SB 5182](#), which provides a property tax exemption for the preservation of affordable housing. This legislation is one of the recommendations from the Seattle HALA report and received a public hearing on January 23rd, in the Senate Human Services, Mental Health and Housing Committee. Robin Koskey, from the Seattle Office of Housing, testified in support.

Affordable Housing: [HB 1797](#), was introduced by Rep. McBride (D) to address local option tools for affordable housing. The bill provides multiple tools such as REET 3, REET 1 and 2 flexibility, sales tax rebate, and changing provisions in [HB 2263](#). In addition, the omnibus bill ([SB 5254](#)) that makes changes to buildable lands, zoning in urban growth areas, affordable housing, and homelessness, introduced by Sen. Fain (R) received a public hearing on January 26th in the Senate Local Government Committee.

Tenant Protections: Sen. Frockt (D) and Rep. Riccelli (D) introduced [SB 5407/HB 1633](#), which prohibits landlords from discrimination based on source of income. In addition, Sen. Cleveland (D) introduced [SB 5408](#) which increases the notification requirements for terminating a residential rental agreement from 20 days to 30 days and provides additional notification of 60 days or more for terminating an agreement where a tenant has occupied a premise for two or more years. Both bills have been scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Financial Institutions and Insurance Committee on January 31st.

While legislation to protect tenants was introduced this past week, legislation ([SB 5569](#)) preempting a city, town, or county, from enacting, maintaining, or enforcing ordinances or other provisions related to tenant protections was introduced by Sen. Angel (R).

Safety Net

Family & Medical Leave Insurance: [HB 1116](#), implementing family and medical leave, passed out of committee on January 23rd, and is now in the House Appropriations Committee. The Senate companion bill ([SB 5032](#)) is scheduled for a public hearing on January 30th in the Senate Commerce, Labor and Sports Committee. A Republican-sponsored bill related to paid family leave, [SB 5149](#), will also be heard in this same committee on January 30th.

Equal Pay: Sen. Cleveland's Equal Pay Act, [SB 5140](#), and a Sen. Fain bill on the same topic, [SB 5344](#), will both be heard on February 1st. In the House, [HB 1533](#) and [HB 1506](#), addressing equal pay, are scheduled for executive session on January 30th.

Safe Injection Sites: Sen. Miloscia (R) and Rep. Stokesbary (R) sponsored [SB 5223/HB 1761](#) to block cities and counties in Washington State from hosting safe injection sites. The Senate bill is scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Health Care Committee on January 30th.

Transportation

REAL ID: Rep. Clibborn (D) and Sen. King (R) introduced legislation aimed at facilitating compliance with the federal REAL ID act ([HB 1041/SB 5008](#)). The bills would modify drivers' licenses and identification card design and fees. Both bills had a public hearing on January 19th. [SB 5008](#) was passed out of the Senate Transportation committee on January 24th, and is now in the Senate Rules Committee.

Distracted Driving: [HB 1371/SB 5289](#), legislation to prevent drivers from holding a smartphone, tablet, or communication device while driving or using a mounted device that requires more than a tap, have not been scheduled for a public hearing in their corresponding committees.

Looking Ahead

We are currently considering days in March to coordinate our second Council Lobby Day. We invite you to attend, as your presence and voice carry great weight as advocates for the City.

As a reminder, the first round of cut off dates are approaching quickly: Policy Committee Cutoff and Fiscal Committee Cutoff, are set for February 17th and February 24th. Bills need to be passed out of their policy and fiscal committees on or before that date in order to be considered this session. Exceptions to these deadlines include bills necessary to implement the budget. The House of Origin Cutoff is on March 8th.
