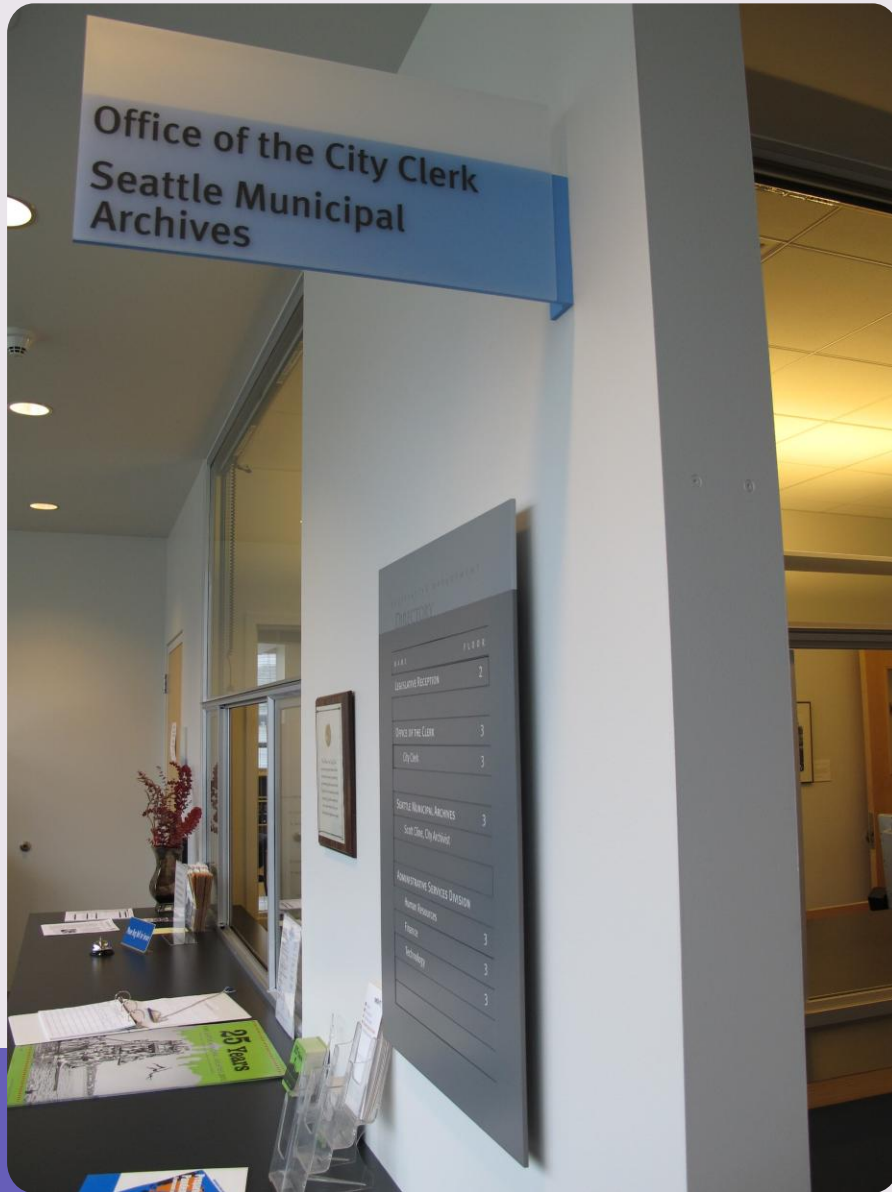

This short course will demonstrate that the Seattle Municipal Archives (SMA) has a lot to offer, from reference sources for city facts to online exhibits to entertaining videos.

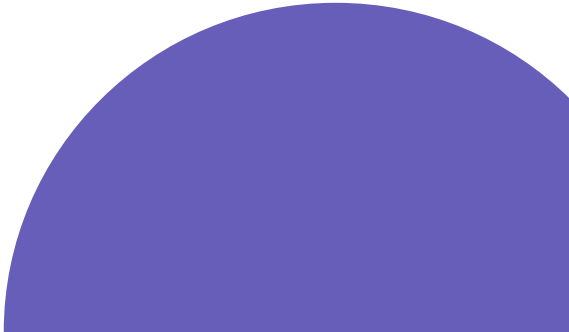


What is the Seattle Municipal Archives?

SMA's holdings document the history, development, and activities of the agencies and elected officials of the City of Seattle.

(That is, records created by or received by City government.)

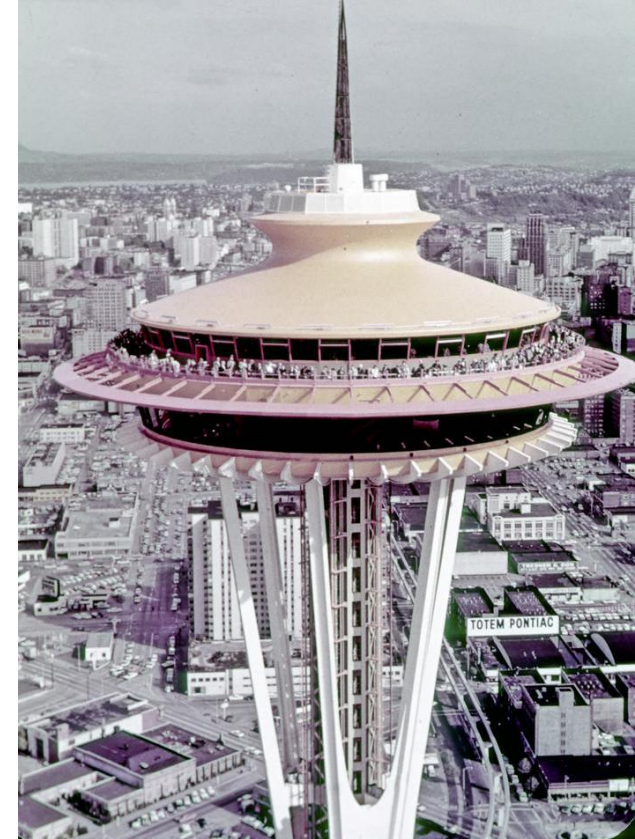
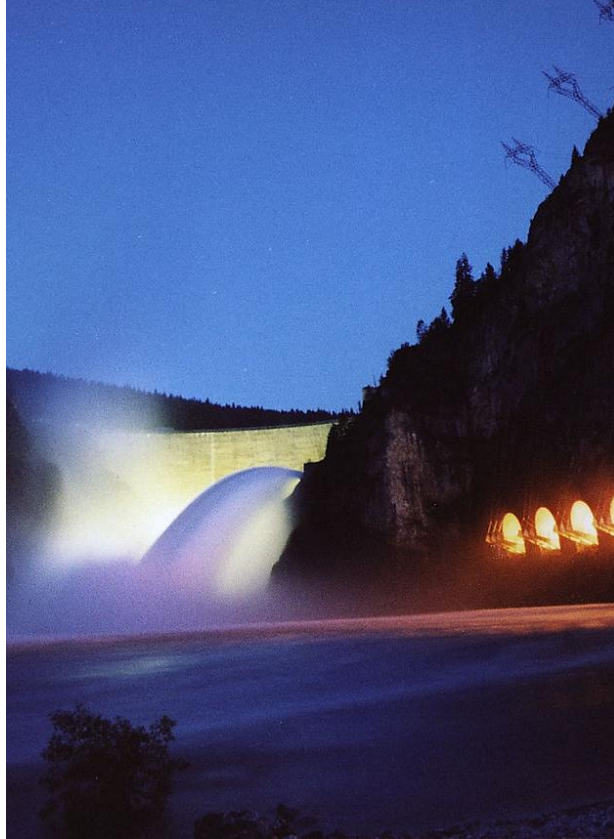
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Show me Seattle history





Interested in stories from Seattle's past? Pull up a chair and check out the [Exhibits & Education section of our website](#), where records from SMA collections are showcased in many different ways to tell tales from the city's history.



[Online exhibits](#) focus on images and text, with topics ranging from the development of the Pike Place Market to the history of police accountability efforts in Seattle. Other exhibits highlight urban renewal programs, Seattle's city halls, the effects of redlining, and the founding of the Daybreak Star Indian Cultural Center, among many other subjects.

Our Digital Document Libraries (DDLs) are a type of online exhibit that focus on providing access to primary sources. They include lots of links to source documents where you can see Seattle's history for yourself. The DDLs were originally designed to help students with research projects but can be useful for anyone who wants to dig into primary sources.

Dear Mr. Mayor;

This will introduce to you a committee of three who were democratically elected by a majority of the residents of what is commonly called Hooverville and they are instructed to take up with you as soon as possible the desperate situation of eviction from our humble homes. We are victims of unemployment and have no other home that we can move into, and the State Department of Welfare has officially informed us that they can do nothing about the matter as they have no funds for any purpose of this kind.

We propose that you do the following to help us save our homes;

- 1- That you and the City Council petition the Port of Seattle to withdraw the present WPA project there in Hooverville, which they have sponsored.
- 2- That you and the City Council petition the Works Progress Administration to withdraw this project until such time as we are provided with other housing which all human beings must have in the Winter months...
- 3- That you aid us in requesting that the City Council as whole receive our duly elected Committee next Monday, October 24th 1938, 2 PM., so we can give all of them a true picture of our situation...

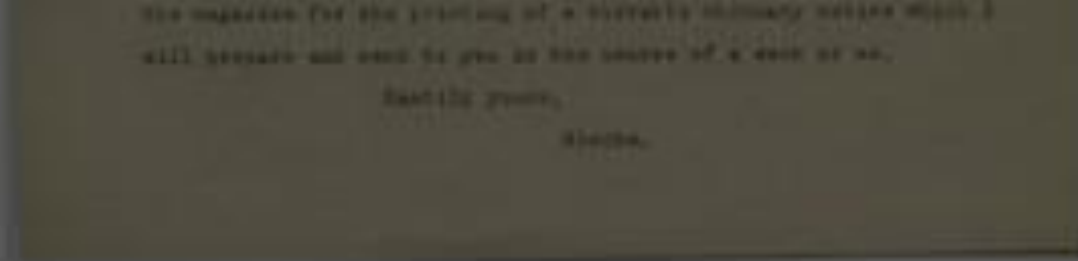
The Committee and all residents will appreciate your cooperation in this civic matter and will do everything possible to cooperate with you as our chief Executive of Seattle in any plan you may devise that will give us a roof over our heads...

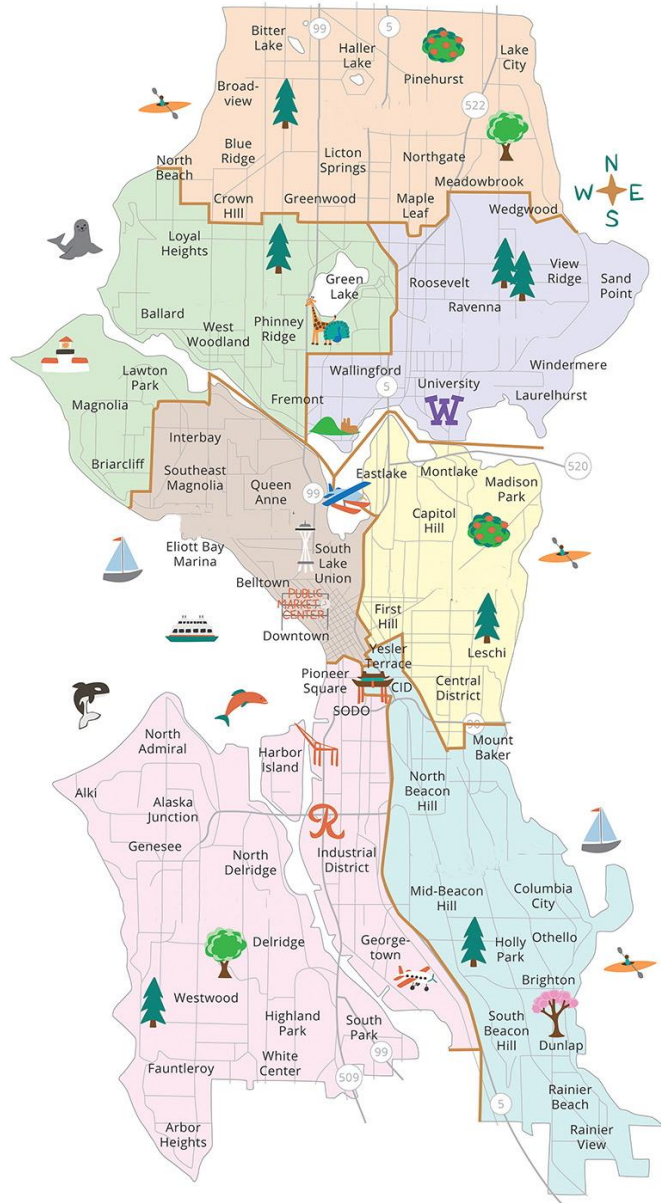

Updated boundaries below take effect January 2024

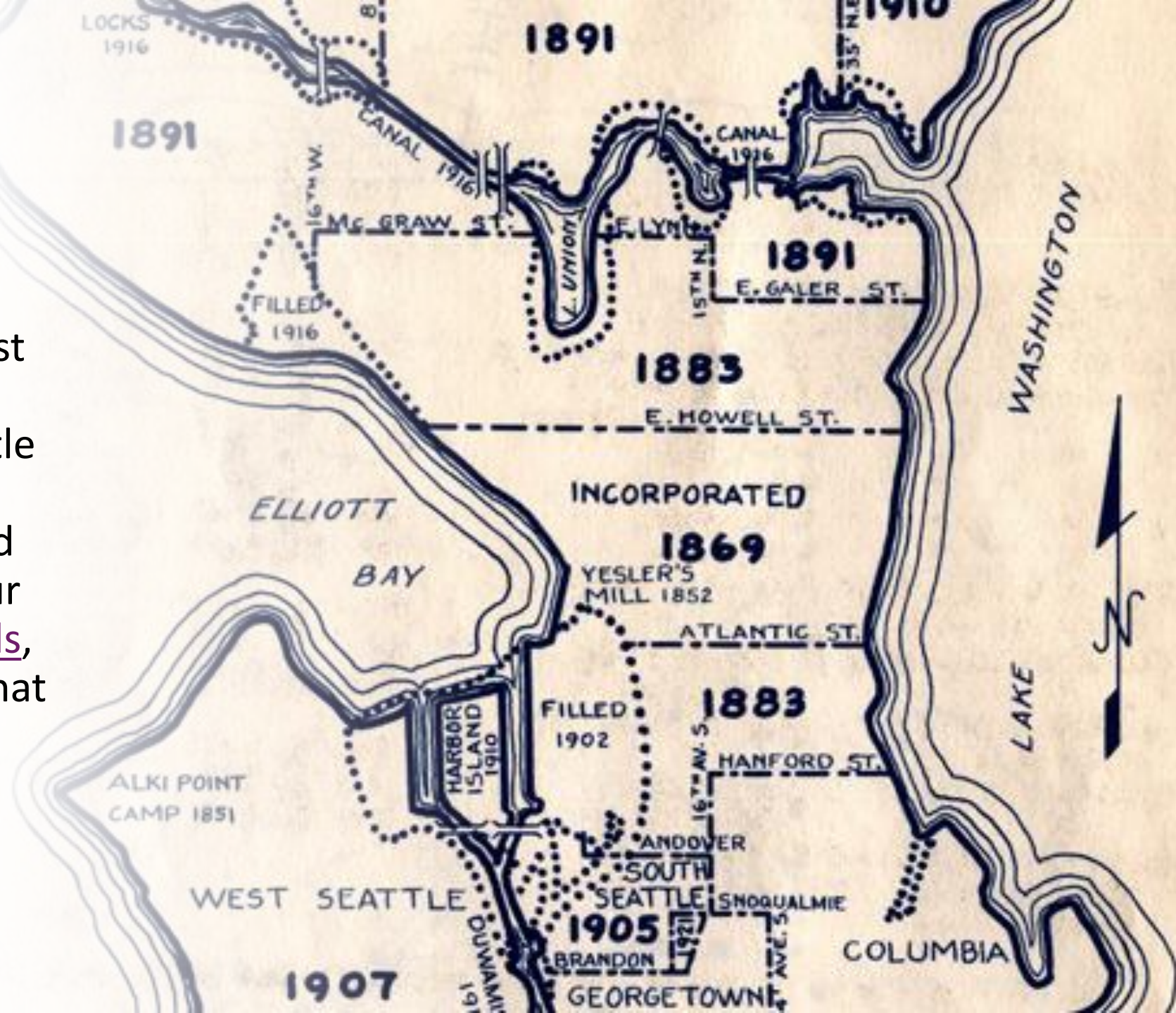

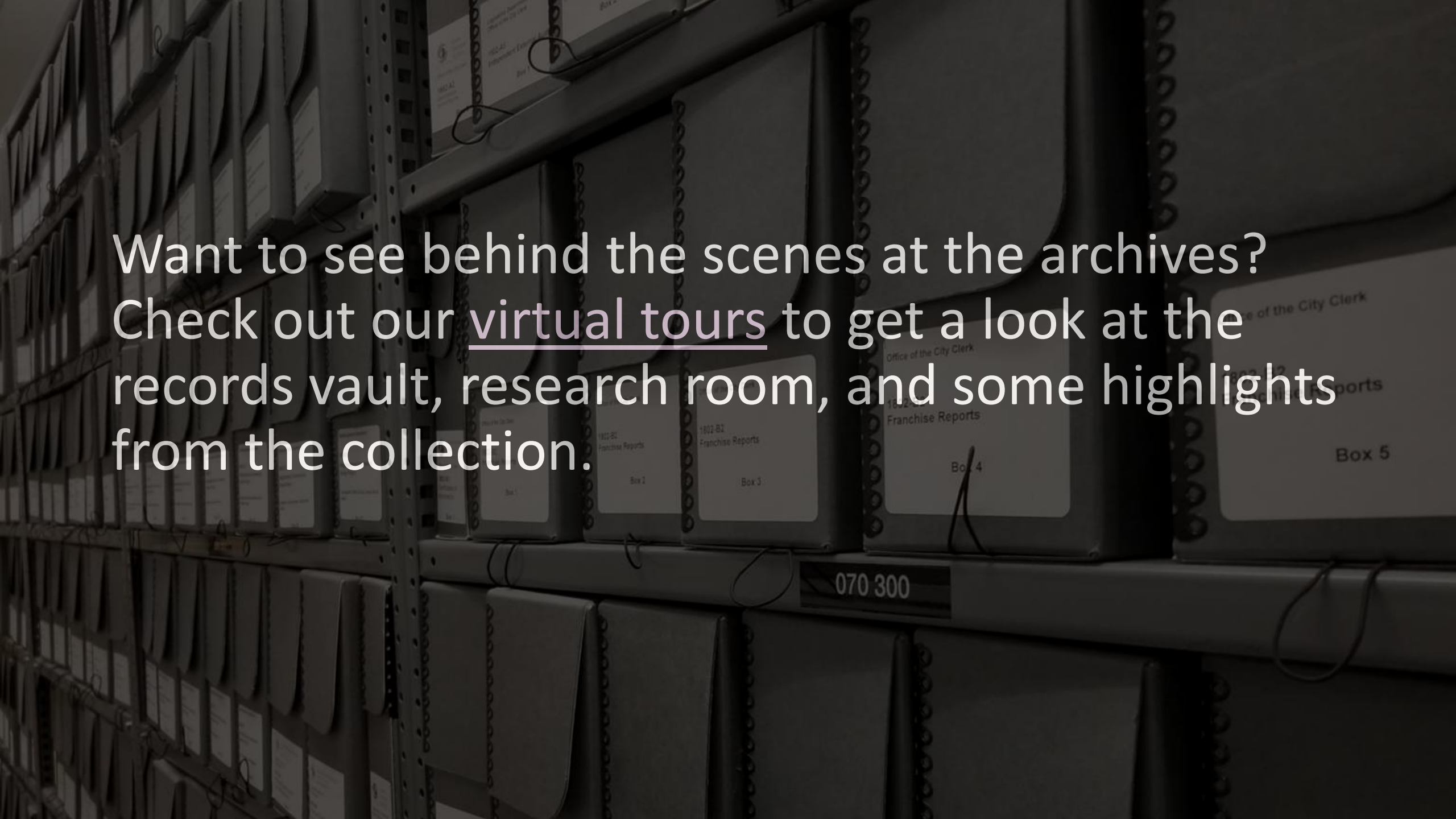


Database help
