Hank, former newsman for the Courier-Times and later for the Mount Vernon Herald, has been away about fifteen years. Reason for his call was that he had been asked things about the upper valley he didn't know.

So we took a day to catch him up—and was he far behind. He had never seen the new Baker dam and the big Baker Lake. He saw it from stem to stern, looked at the dam at one end and the fish hatchery at the other. Then he took photos in the various camps, from Horse-shoe Cove of Shuksan and from Dillard Point of the entire area.

On the tour we saw that he knew all about Cape Horn, the South Skagit road, the Rockport bridge and road to Darrington, the activity around Marblemount and Cascade River Park. Look-see at Ernie Green's new real estate office—an authentic, antique of the valley—a car off the old City Light rails. Complete with original colors and a few feet of rail.

From the state hatchery on Jordan Creek Hank photographed all the way to the Colonial Creek camp grounds at Diablo. With a handful of notes, a half dozen full rolls of film and a headful of information, we sent him along toward Darrington to continue his research. At least when somebody asks about us in the upper Skagit from now on—somebody up there likes us and knows the answers.

Old Newhalem Plant Burns

Flames of undetermined origin have destroyed a City Light landmark near the Skagit River town of Newhalem, Whatcom County, City Light reported today.

The fire, discovered at 7:40 o'clock Saturday evening, leveled a rough frame building that housed a generator turning out 2,000 kilowatts of electricity from Newhalem Creek.

The Volunteer Fire Department fought the fire. The building stood across the Skagit River from Newhalem.

The blaze knocked out the generator. City Light will have to make up for the power loss by buying 2,000 kilowatts from the Bonneville Power Administration for \$37,500 a year.

The damage total depends on the condition of the generator. The building, 30 by 40 feet, was 45 years old and not deemed of much value.

The building and generator were used, beginning in 1921, to provide power for construction of City Light's Gorge Dam, just upstream.

After Gorge was completed, the Newhalem generator was kept "on the line" turning out its 2,000 kilowatts because it was easy to operate. A log across Newhalem Creek served as a dam to divert water to the generator.

Bill Knechtel, ranger of the Baker District, has been appointed to the Skagit County Planning Commission to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Lawrence Hornbeck of Rockport. At the July 12th meeting an application for funds to develop the County Park at Rockport was submitted to the committee, which is composed of park board, game department, Rockport Community Club and state forestry department.

The next big affair for the boosters of the North Cross State Highway will be a Buffalo Meat feed on top of the pass on October 1st. The members from the east side have issued an invitation to all to meet at Helicopter Meadows, near Whistler Cabin—about 2½ miles west of Washington Pass where the last picnic was held. At that time over 500 came in over the unfinished road to reach the picnic site.

This time this portion of the highway will be in good shape and Engineer Dick Carroll promises that the way to Helicopter Meadow will be "passable" for private cars.

A meeting was held in Okanogan last week to plan the affair. The idea is to collect the largest crowd ever to attend a highway outing—the goal set for 2,000 or over. Jack Abrahms, past president of the association, and Denny Lince, Twisp publisher, will handle the details.

Rockport Blowdown State Sale Date Set

Among fourteen parcels of timber to be sold by the state Dept. of Natural Resources will be 234,000 board feet in Rockport Blowdown, No. 3. The blowdown has been appraised at \$8,913 and will be placed on sale August 30th at Sedro-Woolley.

About 17 million board feet of timber is up for bids under the announced sales which will be held in ten different counties August 29th and 30th. Total appraisal by the state is \$491,957.

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ORDINANCE NO. 175

AN ORDINANCE of the Town Council of the Town of Concrete, Washington providing for a submission of a proposition to the qualified electors of the town at a special election to be held on the 20th day of September, 1966, authorizing a special levy of Eighteen Thousand Two Hundred Dollars for the purchase of a new fire engine and equipment for said town.

WHEREAS, it is deemed necessary for the public safety that the town of Concrete, Washington acquire a new fire-fighting truck and necessary fire-fighting equipment; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Concrete has insufficient funds with which to purchase said fire engine and equipment and will not in the foreseeable future have sufficient funds within the budget and,

WHEREAS, in order to provide said sum of \$18,200.00 to purchase the aforesaid fire engine and equipment it is, in the opinion of the Town Council of the Town of Concrete, necessary to raise said funds by special levy over and above the limitations imposed by law and,

WHEREAS, it is necessary that a proposition to raise said funds be submitted to the qualified electors of the Town of Concrete for their ratification or rejection, now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF CONCRETE, WASHINGTON, as follows:

Section 1. That the town shall acquire a new fire truck, fully equipped and for the purpose of providing funds necessary to pay the cost of said emergency capital improvement the town shall levy a tax in excess of the maximum levy provided by law in the sum of \$18,200.00.

Section 2. To impose a tax in said amount, in excess of the maximum levy provided by law, to raise said fund would require a levy of approximately 16 mills based on the 1966 assessed valuation of the Town of Concrete.

Section 3. It is hereby found and declared that an emergency exists requiring the submission of the proposition hereinafter set forth to the electors of the Town at a special election to be held herein on September 20, 1966.

The Skagit County Auditor as ex officio supervisor of elections within Skagit County is hereby requested to call and conduct said special election within the Town on said date. The proposition to be submitted to the qualified electors of the Town shall be in substantially the following form:

FIRE FIGHTING EQUIPMENT SPECIAL LEVY \$18,200.00

Shall the Town of Concrete, Washington levy a tax of \$18,200.00 in excess of the maximum levy provided by law on the assessed valuation of the Town of Concrete, Skagit County, Washington for collection in 1967 and the proceeds thereof to be used for the purpose of
