Seattle City Light is undertaking the wrong kind of environmental soil mitigation which will "clean-up" former substations by destroying the trees and vegetation, which are meaningful to neighborhoods. We need your help to get it on the right path.

Seattle City Light is planning to chop down several beautiful and important trees at the Loyal Heights substation. The trees meet the criteria for exceptional trees per Tree Protection Code. The removal notice states that these trees "stability issues" after clean-up. The trees are healthy and not hazardous now. It is Seattle City Light actions that will destabilize them, so they propose to remove them first. This is plain wrong. Seattle City Light used a soil clean-up process in West Seattle which preserved a cherry tree, conifers and birch trees. The same method can be used here without chopping down trees. There is no reason to treat Ballard differently from West Seattle.

Many neighbors have signed a petition requesting that this substation be preserved as public land. The removal of these trees would significantly degrade the esthetic and ecological value of this site for future use as a public space. With the rapid development of our Ballard neighborhoods, it is all the more critical to work together to save what little green space we have left.

Seattle is a leader in protecting the environment and recognizing the importance of maintaining tree canopy to combat climate change. Our Climate Action Plan is to reach a goal of 30% canopy by 2037. This will not be achieved if we continue to remove mature healthy trees. The City of Seattle has regulations regarding the removal of "significant" trees. Seattle City Light is a public entity and should be held to the same standards as residents.

At the public hearing on his appointment, interim CEO Larry Weiss said that his Number One Priority is Environmental Stewardship. We need him to live up to this promise. Please take immediate action to prevent the destruction of this historical and valuable landscape. Thank you for your attention to this urgent and time-sensitive matter.

Given Larry Weis' lack of a strong commitment to renewable energy as CEO of Austin Power, I am very concerned about the possibility of his being hired as CEO of Seattle City Light. I'm not sure what the motivation was for Mayor Murray to choose Mr. Weis. As a scientist, I have worked in the renewable energy area for about nine years and am committed to pursuing the development of both solar and wind energy in the Pacific Northwest. A number of years ago I worked at 3TIER, a renewable energy forecasting and assessment company, here in Seattle, to develop their solar assessment business area. I've also worked for several years as a consultant to the DOE's National Renewable Energy Laboratory (NREL) in Colorado.



Seattle City Council Members:

As a former Superintendent of Seattle City Light (SCL), I am sending this email to strongly urge you to promptly confirm Larry Weis as the next head of City Light. I have known Larry since he was a mid-level staffer at Snohomish County PUD in the 1980s. He is extremely knowledgeable of Northwest and California energy issues, is familiar with evolving energy markets given his Austin Energy experience and is respected and trusted by other electric utility leaders in our region.

You will obviously make your own judgments about his suitability to take policy guidance and to manage the internal workforce issues at SCL.

My purpose in writing is to describe some of the considerable external industry challenges facing SCL, and other Northwest electric utilities, over the next five years. First, California is on a forced march to generate 50 percent of its electricity from renewables (principally solar) by 2030. This dynamic will create a massive West Coast surplus of overall energy by 2020 and possibly earlier. SCL can either benefit or be significantly harmed by this development. If City Light can use its storage capacity to absorb low-priced California solar, and to provide real-time hydro capacity to help California manage its twice-a-day solar ramps, Seattle can benefit financially. On the other hand, since the California solar surplus will be concentrated in the March-June period (which coincides with SCL/Northwest spring hydro runoff), it is also likely that SCL sales of its surplus hydro will be adversely affected. In fact, SCL's surplus hydro sales are already being significantly depressed due to low market prices. The California solar surplus will exacerbate this trend.

Second, the California Independent System Operator (CAISO – which operates the California transmission grid) is expanding its so-called Energy Imbalance Market (EIM – which manages energy transactions within the hour). Should SCL join this EIM, as Puget Sound Energy and PacifiCorp are doing, or should it forgo those potential benefits by standing pat but risk losing potential trading counterparties (in California and the Northwest) which will put upward pressure on SCL rates.

More importantly, the CAISO is considering, and California Governor Brown is supporting, expansion of that entity to operate a regional electricity market for most of the Western States. The driver for this expansion is the California solar overbuild, and the resultant need to efficiently disburse that solar oversupply to other Western markets. How should SCL approach this potential development? Should it go its own way or seek to collaborate with the Bonneville Power Administration (BPA) on an approach to interacting with an expanded CAISO?

These are two of the most significant external energy developments which will impact SCL. There are numerous others – potential development of a viable utility scale energy storage technology, growth of electric vehicles, the ripple effect of retiring Northwest/Western coal plants, to name a few.

My basic point here, and my plea for you to promptly confirm Larry, is this: the U.S. electric utility industry in general and the Western grid in particular will likely see more market and institutional change in the next five years than it has experienced in the last 50 years. As a former SCL Superintendent and BPA CEO, I am concerned about how the great utility I used to manage will handle that change. We have only to look back to 2001 to see what happened to SCL

during that last period of dramatic market change. While I do not think the potential changes described above will be as rapid as those in 2001, they will likely be just as significant.

To manage SCL through this period's dramatic change, SCL needs a Superintendent who understands the electricity landscape in both the Northwest and California. It needs someone who understands development of wholesale electricity markets, both their potential benefits and, more importantly, their inherent risks. Given SCL's uniquely flexible resource base, SCL can be a probable winner in this time of change. However, insufficient knowledge of upcoming market changes could also make it, and Seattle ratepayers, big losers.

In my 35 years in this business, I have found that it is usually better to anticipate potential changes and try to shape them to your advantage, rather than passively react to those developments when the outcome has already been determined.

Larry Weis, in my judgment, given his experience, knowledge of the Western grid and connection with many of the probable industry decision makers, gives SCL the best chance to successfully navigate this proverbial minefield of challenges. I urge you to promptly confirm him.

I am disappointed in the recent article titled "Austin Energy chief gives candid assessment of utility, city politics". I was troubled by many of the things conveyed in the article and feel a need to communicate my thoughts on this issue to you.

First, I would never expect a member of my executive team to go to the media and share their opinions via an "exit interview" format. I would hope that any member of my team would honor the organization's effort to improve by sharing their thoughts during our internal "exit interview" process. I assure you that I did NOT endorse this public process and was only informed about it after it had occurred.

The opinions shared in this article are not reflective of my perspective. For example, I completely disagree that the City Council is "naïve" about utility issues. This Council has gotten up to speed very quickly and has engaged in "utility issues" on many fronts. Dear City Council Members:

Please find my rebuttal with supporting documentation addressing the comments made by the General Manager of Austin Energy contained in a press release by Austin Energy, dated August 26, 2014, the text of which is recited below.

AUSTIN -- The Austin City Council is considering resolutions this week that would adopt as policy the results of a nine-person citizen Task Force that recommended sweeping changes to the way Austin Energy delivers electricity to its 425,000 customers in the metropolitan Austin area.

The Generation Task Force report includes plans to scrap Decker Power Plant, an economically viable power generator that is essentially paid for. Under the Task Force plan, Decker's capacity would be replaced by contracts with solar providers. Decker and solar plants are not comparable: Decker is available for use day or night and is operated only when it lowers costs for ratepayers. Solar works only when the sun is shining and often raises costs for customers through the Power Supply Adjustment.

<u>CB Counterpoint #1</u>: Decker is our most expensive thermal unit to operate. Decker's steam turbine costs range from \$80.00 to \$95.00/MWh, and Decker's combustion turbines range from \$150.00 to \$200.00/MWh. Thus, its hours of operation have been drawn back drastically since the implementation of the Nodal Market.

CB Counterpoint #2: While Decker may have capacity available for use day or night, it is operated only when there is sufficient scarcity pricing in the wholesale market during peak afternoon hours to support its high operation costs and overall inefficiencies. (See Attachment #2). This is the primary reason why solar power was selected as a replacement after performing a cost analysis because the energy is half the cost, and provides clean efficient peak power during the same time periods of the day that Decker would be able to economically operate.

"Notwithstanding any analyses we may conduct in the future, I can tell you that replacing Decker with solar power contracts would be an economic disaster for ratepayers," said Larry Weis, Austin Energy General Manager. "Austin Energy made \$44 million from Decker in 2011. We cannot afford to lose that income without replacing it with rate increases or elimination of programs that do not produce income.

<u>CB Counterpoint #3</u>: This is in direct contradiction to Larry Weiss' previously delivered memo to city council in March of 2014 stating the 150MW solar PPA will have a favorable impact on the PSA. (See Attachment #3).

CB Counterpoint #4: Decker made money in 2011, but lost money in 2012. (See Attachment #4). Moreover, 2011 represents a one in fifty year weather event with above average scarcity pricing on the ERCOT market while 2012 represents a normal weather year.

CB Counterpoint #5: An historical backcast simulation (a form of cost benefit analysis prepared by Austin Energy using their own generation planning methodology) of a solar plant in West Texas shows that a solar plant would have been in the black in 2011, and actually would have performed better financially in 2012 as compared to the entire natural gas fleet of Decker and SandHill. (See Attachment #5).

"It's straight math. We're obligated to buy solar power at (a reported) \$160 a megawatt hour and we're selling it — at midday on August 26th — for less than \$47 a megawatt hour. Ratepayers are tapped to make up the difference," Weis said. "New solar power may cost as little as \$50 per megawatt hour, but that is still often higher than market. Austin Energy is pro-renewable. We have become national leaders in producing renewable power in a very short period of time when we use good business practices to make decisions.

<u>CB Counterpoint #6</u>: The \$160 megawatt hour rate refers to the existing 30MW Webberville plant that is relatively a very small part of our resource mix and not germane to future generation planning.

(See also Counterpoint #3, #4, and #5.)

"We need to do the business analysis and then patiently take advantage of market changes, new technologies and timing. That's how we can be both green and affordable," Weis said.

<u>CB Counterpoint #7</u>: The Affordable Energy Resolution reconfirms the city's commitment to the affordable energy goals and represents a modest increase in Austin's renewable energy goals.

Weis encouraged decision-makers be patient until Austin Energy delivers to the Austin City Council its thorough business analysis of Task Force results and other options. "We will need to discuss these outcomes in closed session because of the competitive nature of the electric business," Weis said.

"Solar cannot replace natural-gas fired power plants today," Weis said. "It's the other way around: very efficient, combined-cycle natural gas plants allow us to add solar to meet environmental goals and remain affordable. Solar is a good thing. The Task Force wants too much of a good thing."

CB Counterpoint #8: The Affordable Energy Resolution does not call for solar to replace Austin Energy's entire natural gas fleet. The Sandhill plant represents the largest portion of our natural gas energy resource mix that will continue to operate, notwithstanding the Resolution. (See Attachment #8). Importantly, Austin Energy has repeatedly stated that the Decker plant, which represents our oldest thermal resource, is already being forced into economic retirement due to its age and cost to operate.

Weis acknowledged that the Task Force report calls for actions to be taken only if they do not cause more than a 2 percent increase in rates and no significant change in competitiveness. "If the generation plan is adopted before running the business analysis, Austin Energy will have to

come back to Council year after year to report that the plan it adopted conflicts with its affordability goals and cannot be implemented," Weis said.

<u>CB Counterpoint #9</u>: Austin Energy is required by the Climate Protection Plan to report back annually to council notwithstanding the Affordable Energy Resolution.

Weis said that the rush to adopt the Task Force report prior to Austin Energy's release of a new study within 30 days is reminiscent of a rush to buy the \$2.3 billion output of a woodchip-burning plant in East Texas in August 2008.

CB Counterpoint #10: The Affordable Energy Resolution is the ongoing effort of many years of hard work by various working groups, task forces, public hearings and advisory committees on a generation plan that is updated every two years. It represents a thorough and diligent public process with all stakeholders, including Austin Energy, having the opportunity to participate in a proactive manner throughout. Maintaining affordable rates through smart adoption of clean energy has been a staple of the city council policy easily going back over a decade.

"Exactly six years ago, prior to my arrival, Austin Energy was rushed into an agreement to buy billions of dollars worth of power created by burning East Texas woodchips. A lot of people – consumer advocates, business people, the newspaper and some environmentalists – said we should slow down and apply good business practices. The purchase of the biomass plant was pushed through and today, we buy power from that plant for about three times market cost for power, which in my mind is not affordable."

CB Counterpoint #11: Austin Energy, in its current generation plan (as of December 2013), proposes to add an additional 1,000MW of natural gas units by 2019. (See Attachment #11). Experts from all sides of the aisle, however, have repeatedly forewarned that the cost of natural gas and carbon are going to continue to rise. Dr. Michelle Foss, Chief Energy Economist of the Center for Energy Economics Bureau of Economic Geology, stated at a recent Texas PUC public hearing that: "We are well into a roughly \$6/mmbtu price range for natural gas in the not too distant future because so many of the new uses for natural gas are coming online in the 2017 timeframe."

<u>CB Counterpoint #12</u>: The upward shifts in natural gas prices are already being felt by Austin Energy customers. As example, Austin Energy stated at the last EUC meeting on the AE budget that the current increase in the PSA is primarily due to the spike in natural gas prices.

<u>CB Counterpoint #13</u>: The Affordable Energy Resolution ensures that we maintain a broad portfolio mix of generation resources not becoming too dependent on any one fuel source which by all means is the financially prudent course to affordable rates.

The Decker replacement is only one of many recommendations, none of which has been analyzed for cost.

CB Counterpoint #13: To make a blanket statement that no cost analysis was reviewed or performed by a council appointed task force is unbecoming of a general manager of a municipally owned utility and, from my perspective, far removed from the truth. Importantly, the general manager failed to attend any one of the fourteen plus public meetings of the generation planning task force.

Recommendation

Austin Energy is submitting a Recommendation for Council Action (attached) to be considered at the March 20 and March 27 Council meetings consistent with policy for two hearings regarding projects over 10 MW. The proposed power purchase agreement (PPA) with SunEdison is for a term of up to 25 years for up to 150 MW of solar-generated electricity, at pricing in the range of \$45-\$55/MWh, estimated at \$21,000,000 per year, for a total estimated contract amount of \$525,000,000.

Austin Energy is recommending executing a PPA with SunEdison for a base quantity of 100 MW with the ability to exercise an option for an additional 50 MW. If the 50 MW option is exercised, the quantity would be split between two West Texas sites, which must remain confidential until pre-construction development agreements are completed. Both projects would be based on single axis tracking, photovoltaic technology. Either quantity is expected to have a very small but favorable impact to Austin Energy's Power Supply Adjustment over the 25-year term of the agreement. With the addition, Austin Energy expects to meet and potentially exceed the utility scale component of its solar goal and sustain the early attainment of its 35% renewable energy goal which it expects to reach by the end of 2016, based on current estimates for wind and solar production and customer demand.

Background

On October 21, 2013, Austin Energy issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) for 25 to 50 Megawatts (MW) of solar resources. The RFP was timed to continue progress towards our 35% renewable and solar goals and to take advantage of federal incentives for solar development. The recommendation reflects an opportunity to make significant progress on our solar goal at very competitive costs.


Austin Energy received proposals based on 66 different projects with over 120 proposal variations. Approximately 95% of the proposals were based on West Texas locations. For large scale solar projects, West Texas offers the combined benefits of large and inexpensive land resources and better solar resources than central and eastern parts of the state. As a result, the handful of projects offered in the Austin area was on average twice as expensive as those located in West Texas locations. The recommendation maximizes value derived from federal incentives and project scale and reflects a considerable decrease in the cost of solar.







I realize you do not set the salary for Department heads and I have shared the below information with the Mayor. I know there is concern by environmental groups about Larry Weis' nomination as Superintendent for Seattle City Light. I don't know enough about him to have an opinion on whether or not to confirm him, but I'd like to press the issue of his potential salary. It is unfair and leads to the worsening of inequity in Seattle. From my email to the Mayor:

I have been a Seattle City Light employee for over 15 years. I recently completed contract negotiations on behalf of my fellow L 17 coworkers. L 17 presented direct evidence to Seattle's Labor Negotiations group indicating where City employees were being paid less than market value. The City presented their list of positions the City has had difficulty hiring or retaining employees because the City pays less than market rates. There was overlap in these two lists and agreement to raise the wages of employees below market rates. What we got for those members was a 3.5% wage increase. Some of those positions were more than 10% below market-including mine. We argued for more money but didn't get it. We were told it "cost too much".

Negotiations concluded and then I read in the paper where you are going to pay Larry Weis, incoming interim CEO and GM of City Light \$340,000-about \$115,000 more than Jorge, who left in disgrace. You stated in the press release that Larry will get the pay he deserves, and people should get paid what they deserve.

Where was that sentiment for the nearly 10,000 employees who do the actual work in this City every day?

Do not pay Larry Weis that much money. It is an insult to every City employee and especially to all City Light employees who are still getting paid below market rates every day.

I'd like to hear from you why you think Larry deserves such an exorbitant salary for a public employee.

I am writing as a follow up to my testimony before the Energy and Environment Committee on Wednesday February 17 in support of the confirmation of Larry Weis for Superintendent of Seattle City Light.

I believe Mr. Weis is the right person for the job because of his proven ability to lead publicly-owned utilities to achieve measurable changes in performance around new missions.

Notably, Mr. Weis has led utilities to achieve significant improvements in renewable energy performance. His record is unimpeachable in that regard. To achieve those impressive results required encouraging innovative thinking and actions and development of new policies to achieve policy-makers' goals.

However, unlike Austin, which recruited Weis based in part on his track record of increasing renewables in a utility's portfolio, I don't think that should be the driver for the hiring of him for SCL leadership. SCL has achieved the goal of being climate neutral and has numerous effective programs to meet load through conservation.

Council needs to look not in the rear view mirror of what SCL has done in the past to determine requirements for leadership but literally out the front windshield to where SCL is going and how Mr. Weis will lead SCL to maintain its existing programs and achieve its new mission: replacing oil as the dominant transportation fuel with clean electricity.

Every day thousands of fossil fueled vanpools, trucks and buses move people and freight around our city. Their emissions cause incalculable harm to our people & children via lung ailments and to our climate. If instead these vehicles were supplied with SCL electricity, they would become truly zero emission vehicles.

Over the years, SCL has taken on new policy-maker directed paradigm shifting missions by tapping into its innovative and talented employees to achieve great results - from reliable and inexpensive power to meeting load with conservation and renewables; from a mixed energy portfolio to the first utility of its size to achieve climate neutrality. These were ground breaking changes with regional and national impact that redefined the role of the utility.

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

Dear City Council Members,

The Stranger reported this week on the Public Meeting at the Wednesday 2/17/16 Energy and Environment Committee meeting. I also attended the meeting, and the theme for the evening was environmentalism. Clean energy and low emissions are an important value of our community and please be assured this was an important selection criteria of the Search Committee for the new Seattle City Light General Manager. During public comment, there were a number of speakers who expressed concern with Mr. Weis, fearing he would not be a strong environmental advocate. Ironically, Mr. Weis has one of the strongest environmental record of any utility leader in the United State. This may not have been common knowledge at the meeting.

There were several concerns about Mr. Weis' support of a new gas-fired generating facility for Austin Energy. It is important to understand the context for Austin Energy. Unlike our region which has benefited from almost 100 years of clean hydro energy, the Texas utilities have historically relied upon carbon fuel for their generating plants, which a large percentage of coal, oil, and natural gas plants. During his tenure at Austin Energy, Mr. Weis significantly shifted that energy mix for that utility, with plans to divest of their share of a coal plant and retiring an old inefficient gas/oil-fired plant. The latter is being replaced with a smaller, more efficient plant, renewable energy (wind power, solar power), and energy efficiency. Rome wasn't built in a day, but under Mr. Weis' leadership, Austin Energy has made aggressive moves to become 50% renewable for 2025.

Environmental stewardship is very important, but there are many other elements needed for strong utility leadership. Seattle City Light and Austin Energy both share the following core utility values: affordability, reliability, and safety. Our utility has approximately \$1 billion in assets and is the largest city department. It provides a critical service to all types of customers. We are able to attract investment in Seattle because of our low rates and there must be continued focus on this. Businesses trust the utility to commit to the rate path that the Council previously approved.

Reliability is hugely important to all customer classes. Residential customers count on reliable service to keep their homes warm and their appliances on. The business sector, especially those in high tech, hospitals and research, and industry, need consistent power quality and continued reliability. Many customers are unware of the aging utility infrastructure, both in Seattle and across the country. To maintain reliability, there must be diligent investment in, and management of, major utility capital projects. Operations budgets also must be planned to provide continued high reliability. The third shared value is safety for the workforce and the community. Historically, Seattle City Light was weak in this area compared to peers. While progress has been made in recent years, there is more that a strong leader can do to improve safety measures for our workforce and community.

Seattle has another core value and that is a commitment to equity for members of our community, that is unique here and not a core value for most utilities. This has been reflected in the Race and Social Justice Initiative. Mr. Weis comes from a diverse community in Austin, Texas. To see his management team is to

know he is committed to diversity. His direct reports include a large number of men and women of color, with differing backgrounds and areas of expertise.

The Search Committee members were asked to provide criteria for the position description and the selection criteria. A number of Seattle City Light Review Panel members emphasized the importance of bringing in someone with prior experience. Mr. Weis been the head of three other utilities, Pend Oreille, Turlock Irrigation District and Austin Energy, which made him stand out amongst the applicants. He started his career as a utility worker and moved his way up the ranks. This is important because he was a represented employee and can work well with the multiple unions and large represented work force at Seattle City Light.

But, the Search Committee determined that experience alone was not enough. The new Seattle City Light GM has to be able to manage through change. The utility industry is changing quickly, chiefly as a result of new regulation, new market developments, new technology, and increasing vigilance against cyber and physical security breaches. Because Seattle City Light has historically performed smoothly, most customers take affordable, reliable, and safe service for granted and many may be unware of the operations "behind the scene" that make that happen.

But our utility is very complex- it has transmission, distribution, and generation. It makes very large investments in energy efficiency, runs a large customer call center, and is active representing our interests in regional forums. And, our utility business is likely to become even more complex as a result of new advanced meters, customer-driven energy management (demand for time of use rates and smart thermostats and appliances), transportation electrification, and growth in distributed energy resources (customer-sited small scale wind, solar, and batteries). Mr. Weis has worked in two locations that have been on the cutting edge of these trends- California and the City of Austin, TX. He has a record of leading innovative utilities, directing large and expensive technology initiatives, and managing significant capital projects.

There has been much talk about the compensation set for the new General Manager. Prior to the start of the search, the mayor's office reviewed data from the American Public Power Association and discovered that Seattle had been woefully underpaying its general manager, compared to other large public power entities and determined a competitive public power salary would be required to attract strong candidates. While the new salary offered to Mr. Weis is higher than the prior GM's and higher than that of other city department heads, please understand that public power general managers earn significantly less than the heads of similarly-sized electric coops and investor owned utilities. Someone like Mr. Weis who *could* lead a coop or IOU, elects to be in public power to serve the community.

Mr. Weis is a very strong candidate, not only among the candidates who applied for the position but also amongst utility leaders across the country. Our utility has not had a full-time experienced leader since May 2015- ten months is long time. The leadership team and the employees at Seattle City Light have performed admirably. But, our utility is embarking on major technology and infrastructure projects, where strong leadership is critical for success. We hope you will soon appoint Mr. Weis to assume the helm of this City's impressive electric utility.

Dear Councilmembers,

I am writing as a follow up to my testimony before the Energy and Environment Committee on Wednesday February 17 in support of the confirmation of Larry Weis for Superintendent of Seattle City Light.

I believe Mr. Weis is the right person for the job because of his proven ability to lead publicly-owned utilities to achieve measurable changes in performance around new missions.

Notably, Mr. Weis has led utilities to achieve significant improvements in renewable energy performance. His record is unimpeachable in that regard. To achieve those impressive results required encouraging innovative thinking and actions and development of new policies to achieve policy-makers' goals.

However, unlike Austin, which recruited Weis based in part on his track record of increasing renewables in a utility's portfolio, I don't think that should be the driver for the hiring of him for SCL leadership. SCL has achieved the goal of being climate neutral and has numerous effective programs to meet load through conservation.

Council needs to look not in the rear view mirror of what SCL has done in the past to determine requirements for leadership but literally out the front windshield to where SCL is going and how Mr. Weis will lead SCL to maintain its existing programs and achieve its new mission: replacing oil as the dominant transportation fuel with clean electricity.

Every day thousands of fossil fueled vanpools, trucks and buses move people and freight around our city. Their emissions cause incalculable harm to our people & children via lung ailments and to our climate. If instead these vehicles were supplied with SCL electricity, they would become truly zero emission vehicles.

Over the years, SCL has taken on new policy-maker directed paradigm shifting missions by tapping into its innovative and talented employees to achieve great results - from reliable and inexpensive power to meeting load with conservation and renewables; from a mixed energy portfolio to the first utility of its size to achieve climate neutrality. These were ground breaking changes with regional and national impact that redefined the role of the utility.

Mayor Murray stated in his State of the City Address, "The time is right to spread the benefits of our clean, carbon neutral electricity to Seattle's Transportation Sector." I agree and this is why I strongly support Mr. Weiss.

The shift to SCL focusing on out competing climate destroying fossil fuel supplied by exploding oil-trains, leaking pipelines or running aground oil tankers from Shell, Exxon Mobil and Tesoro is every bit as big as what SCL has achieved in the past.

This new mission for SCL is inherently interdisciplinary and will require close coordination with multiple departments and partners. I was very pleased to hear that in preparation for the confirmation process that Mr. Weiss met several times with Jessica Coven, director of OSE. OSE plays a unique function in collaborating with City departments to achieve the City's Climate Plan and environmental goals. It is evident that Mr. Weiss understands the importance of OSE and that his role is not to go it alone.

Mr. Weiss, in order to accelerate the transition to zero emission transportation, will need to confront multiple questions. For example: Should SCL provide on-bill financing for employers to establish charging infrastructure for EV vanpool vehicles? Should SCL proved a special rate for battery-electric bus charging along with bus trolleys? Should SCL cover the costs of transformer and feeder upgrades and charging stations for battery-electric bus charging? Should SCL provide financing like it does for the higher upfront costs of conservation measures to cover the higher costs of batteries for heavy duty EVs? What new policies and legal authority are needed to take on these new functions? What are the fair costs to ratepayers?

Today, SCL is supplying transportation fuel to bus trolleys, light rail, light duty EVs, cold ironing cruise ships etc. It can do so much more.

I'm confident with the strong direction from the Mayor's Office and from Council that SCL can achieve its next big challenge with Mr. Weis at the helm.

Please confirm Larry Weis.
