#### MENTAL HEALTH INVESTMENTS: COUNCIL BUDGET ACTIONS

SY22-23: \$500K → Student Mental Health Supports (SMHS) Pilot

SY23-24/SY24-25: \$4M → Pilot expands to Student Mental Health Supports Network (SMHSN)

# CULTURALLY-SPECIFIC RESPONSIVE (CSR) FOCUS

There's a **critical gap** in providing CSR, healing-centered mental health services for BIPOC students.

"We want more counselors and therapists with similar lived experiences as the youth they serve. Students need someone they can count on and relate to."

#### **NEEDS ASSESSMENT ANALYSIS**

#### Filters:

• Include comprehensive (<u>non-option</u>) high schools

#### Benchmarks:

- Schools with a decile score of 4.0 or higher on student demographics composite
- Schools with a decile score of 4.0 or higher on mental health need composite

## Student Mental Health Supports Network (SMHSN) Goals

#### Page 3 in the RFI Overview Document

- **Goal 1**: Leverage the expertise of **trusted community-based partners** to offer CSR mental health supports across the continuum by providers who **share BIPOC students' identities** and who have similar lived experiences, inclusive of family engagement centered on CSR family supports that are multilingual, asset-based, and welcoming.
- Goal 2: Identify and address root causes and indicators of student mental health issues (risk factors), including substance abuse, disconnection from school and ongoing truancy and absenteeism, and unhealthy relationships, while providing experiences and environments that can sustain and improve student mental health (protective factors), including delivering professional development that promotes adult learning to support students and creating opportunities for student-led decision-making by authentically sharing power and investment resources with youth.
- Goal 3: Embed and implement culturally-responsive healthcare and hiring practices within clinical care supports and SBHCs to increase language access, referral for services, trauma-informed approaches, and person-centered healthcare.

#### Page 2 of RFI Overview Document

- Strengthen coordination among partners (schools; community-based partners; students and families),
- Leverage participant expertise to provide more coordinated and streamlined care to students and families,
