Seattle Fire was later called in to assist with a medical concern.


The following resources were provided:


- 1. Hot chocolate

- 4 individuals outright declined services.


5 individuals are interested in immediate referrals to the sanctioned encampments (2 were transitioned to shelter & 1 to a friend's home).





















