


One Seattle Comprehensive Plan

CLIMATE CHANGE

Climate change is happening now, and the impacts are damaging our community. From sweltering heatwaves and wildfires that choke our air, to rising seas and extreme floods washing out roads, Seattle is experiencing the impacts of climate change. Like most cities, Seattle is working to manage these harmful impacts. At the same time, we must act now to reduce carbon emissions that contribute to future climate change from our two largest sources: transportation and buildings.

Meeting our climate goals is also an opportunity to create jobs and advance an equitable transition towards renewable energy by prioritizing investments in communities historically most harmed by economic, racial, and environmental injustices.




Seattle's greenhouse gas emissions are growing.


Let's Talk About the Future
