

Bitter Lake Reservoir Open Space Project

Engagement #1 Summary

Project Overview

Seattle Public Utilities (SPU) is replacing the existing reservoir with a concrete tank that has a smaller footprint. This design provides additional open space for an expanded park for the community. Seattle Parks and Recreation (SPR) is leading the park and open space design in coordination with SPU, the Office of Arts and Culture and the Department of Neighborhoods. This project will incorporate elements of the existing park together with new recreation amenities, public art, and a potential P-Patch expansion.

Engagement Process

This first phase of engagement focused on sharing the project and hearing from community members about their current experiences with the Bitter Lake Reservoir Park, what they would like to see in the future, and what concerns and priorities they have. Community feedback will help shape the three park design concepts that the project team will develop. The community will have another opportunity to provide feedback on the three park design concepts to help refine them and select a final design.

The following sections are a summary and key themes of the three engagement activities: a focus group, in-person open house, and online survey.

Focus Group

The focus group was held on Thursday, October 26, 2023 from 3:00 – 4:00 p.m. at the Bitter Lake Community Center in the Family Room. The focus group provided an opportunity for community members to learn more about the project and to provide their perspectives, priorities, feedback, concerns, and ideas on the park and open space design (see Appendix A for the focus group summary memo).

Through a facilitated conversation, participants shared what they felt was currently missing at the Bitter Lake Reservoir park and open space.

- Not enough P-patch space
 - Where can we expand to?
 - Don't want to disturb the current patch
 - Would be nice to have edible plants demonstrations for the community
- Expand the playground
- Basketball court
- Accessible paths
- Need sitting benches
- More lighting
- Mountain bike paths
- Amphitheater
- Some level ground for informal play
- Plant more trees, to help with cooling

- A path or loop around the park that's protected
- A dog park
 - Perhaps on the west side to offer more activity on that side of the park for the residents along Fremont Ave N
 - Not welcomed idea by one resident who lives there because of the noise
 - Could consider a buffer between the dog park and residents
- A sound park
- Spray park
- Would like a restroom, but recognize it's costly and requires maintenance
- Parking
 - Maybe time-limited spots
- A sledding hill

When asked what made participants feel safe, they responded having open space where you could see far and keep an eye on children playing (e.g., Yesler Terrace Park), clean space, activity and people around, and overhead and pathway lighting. Additionally, participants asked the project team to take a look at storm water plants and trim those that are overgrown because they are blocking access to the park and to be mindful of mature plan heights so that trees do not shade out the P-Patch. A participant asked for more accessible P-Patch spots, especially for people who are older or using mobility devices.

In closing, the project team shared they would keep the participants informed of the next round of engagement (likely early 2024), that there was a public survey open until November 10 (this was extended to November 20), and thanked everyone for their time and insights. A participant asked if they could invite other interested people, particularly younger people and families, to the next focus group, and the project team enthusiastically encouraged them to please do so.

In-person Open House

The open house was held on Thursday, October 26, 2023, from 6:00 – 8:00 p.m. at the Bitter Lake Community Center in the Multipurpose Room. The open house provided an opportunity for community members to learn more about the project and to provide their perspectives, priorities, feedback, concerns, and ideas on the park and open space design. In total, 17 people visited the open house, including six youth from the Bitter Lake Community Center.

Station 3: Site analysis and photo display boards with proposed programming/improvement opportunities that participants could vote for with sticker dots (see Appendix B for comments left on boards and stick dot counts)

Primary desires expressed for public art direction via survey and discussion at the October 26 Open House: The artwork(s) should be:

- Eye catching/colorful
- Reflect the diversity of the neighborhood
- Tell the story of the water

Multiple people also expressed a desire for more seating and shade protection- which could connect to art amenities.

Earthwork shapes that people sculpted at the sandbox model experimented with lots of opportunity for play such as mounds for climbing and lookout points. Others also experimented with creating earthwork forms that interacted with potential water elements.

Survey

The seven-question survey (see Appendix D for the survey questions and responses) was hosted online from October 26 to November 20 on SurveyMonkey and translated into Amharic, traditional Chinese, and Spanish based on recommendations from past engagement by SPU. A total of 154 people took the survey.

When asked **how they use the existing park** (multiple selections allowed), the majority of respondents selected “Use pathways to walk, run, bike, roll, etc.” (37.7% of respondents selected this activity) and “Play sports or games” (34.9% of respondents selected this activity), followed by “To be physically active and exercise” (30.1% of respondents selected this activity). Of the comments left when respondents selected “Other,” 75.0% mentioned pickleball, as something they play or want to play at the park. Other comments mentioned not visiting or using the park much because of lack of space, using the park as a rest stop while bicycling or to exercise their dog, and to tan.

The next survey question asked respondents **which recreation features and activities they most want to see included in the existing and expanded park and to rate their interest level**. Respondents had the highest interest in paved and unpaved walking paths/trails (weighted average of 3.8), courts for tennis, basketball, volleyball, etc. (weighted average of 3.6), formal running track/paths (weighted average of 3.2), and expanding the playground (weighted average of 3.2). Of the 68 comments received when respondents selected “Other,” nearly three-fourths (73.5%) mentioned pickleball courts, specifically dedicated, covered, and with lights. Other comment themes included wanting safe open space for formal and informal play and use, expansion of the P-Patch, and specific activity uses such as a wading pool and splash park, skate park, sand volleyball court, and cycling.

Survey respondents were then asked to **think about the best parks they have visited and what makes them their favorite or stand out and what makes them feel safe**. Key themes of the 107 comments included:

- Outdoor activities and recreation
 - Pickleball was mentioned often, specifically well-maintained and lit courts
 - Space for play, picnics and gatherings, and to enjoy the outdoors
 - Outdoor fitness equipment
 - Paths and trails for multiple uses
 - Pump track
 - Spray park
 - Art integrated into recreation, like a salmon slide
- Trees and green spaces
 - Plentiful trees and natural green spaces to relax and play in nature
 - A nice view or landscaping
- Park facilities
 - Restrooms
 - Trash cans
 - Covered areas/shelters
 - Artwork
- Safety and security
 - Adequate lighting around park and parking area
 - Clean spaces and restrooms
 - Open sight lines
 - People and activity in the area
 - No encampments or use of drugs in the area
 - Regular security patrols
- Accessibility and inclusivity
 - Seating areas
 - Connections to park, for example so people can bike to it
 - Mix of activities for people of all abilities, ages, and background; the neighborhood is very diverse
 - Accessible playground (currently the Bitter Lake Reservoir playground has woodchips and that can be difficult to navigate for people with mobility devices)
 - Near by businesses to visit and support

- Respondents also listed several parks in other geographies specifically for their pickleball courts

Respondents shared **additional considerations** for the design team for the expanded Bitter Lake Reservoir Park and Open Space. Key themes of the 81 comments included:

- Additional features for outdoor activities and recreation
 - A desire for dedicated pickleball courts, especially well-lit, covered ones
 - All weather soccer field and sand volleyball court
 - Covered picnic area
 - Paths and trails for multiple activities, such as walking, running, cycling, rolling, etc.
 - Wading pool or spray park
 - Several respondents commented that they would not like a dog park along the west side of the park
 - Nature play for children, rather than elaborate toy sets
 - Dog park with paw washing station
- Park facilities
 - EV charging stations
 - Restrooms, with sharps/biohazards bin
 - Trash cans
 - Parking spaces
 - Free library/pantry
- Safety and security
 - Safety features such as fencing with smaller gaps, security cameras, or security patrols to deter crime
 - Keep the fence on the west side of the park and protect the privacy of residents living along the west side of the park
 - Adequate lighting
 - Design to have open sight lines
 - Prevent encampments
- Garden and natural spaces
 - Avoid impacts to the current P-Patch during the expansion and expand it
 - Add a perennial edible landscape/food forest; integrate the food forest into a landscape park model
 - More trees and shaded areas
- Accessibility
 - Need accessible areas and spaces for people of all abilities, ages, and backgrounds
 - Connect bike trails to the park

The final three survey questions asked about respondents' demographics information. The majority of respondents shared that they had a household member who was 65 years old or older (32.0%). Over a

third of households (41.3%) include a person who is 18 years old or younger. The majority of respondents identified (multiple responses were allowed) as white or Caucasian (70.6%) with the next largest group of respondents identifying as Asian or Asian American (25.3%). Respondents were mostly connected to the community as someone who didn't live or work in the Bitter Lake neighborhood, but was a frequent visitor (45.6% of respondents selected this choice) or someone who lived in the Bitter Lake neighborhood and could walk or bike to the park (37.6% of respondents selected this choice).

Meeting summary:

The focus group was held on Thursday, October 26, 2023 from 3:00 – 4:00 p.m. at the Bitter Lake Community Center in the Family Room. The focus group provided an opportunity for community members to learn more about the project and to provide their perspectives, priorities, feedback, concerns, and ideas on the park and open space design.

Nancy Thai (Consor) welcomed participants and shared a brief overview of the Bitter Lake Reservoir Open Space Project, led by Seattle Parks and Recreation, and its relationship to the Bitter Lake Reservoir Improvement Project, led by Seattle Public Utilities. Aaron Luoma (HBB) and Lael Alderman (Consor) walked participants through a map of Bitter Lake Reservoir to point out different aspects of the project.

Participants shared their names and which community or group they represented. During introductions, one resident shared their concerns about safety and visibility along the western side of the reservoir (Fremont Ave N) and worsening road conditions along the northside of the reservoir (N 143rd St) due to a berm removal 13 years ago. The berm removal has undermined the concrete panels and potholes are deepening due to water seeping in.

Aaron facilitated a conversation on what participants felt was currently missing at the Bitter Lake Reservoir park and open space. Participants shared several thoughts:

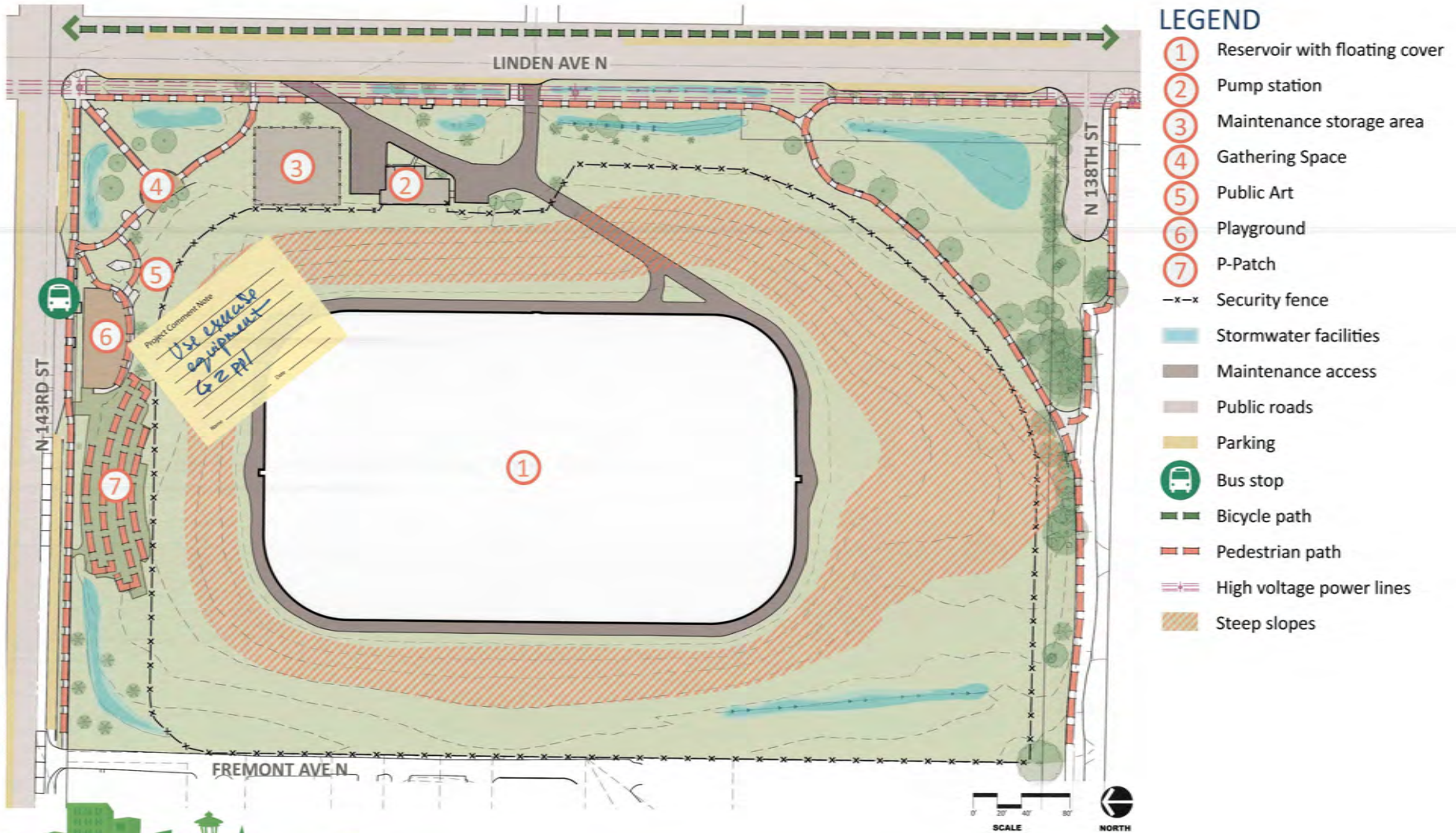

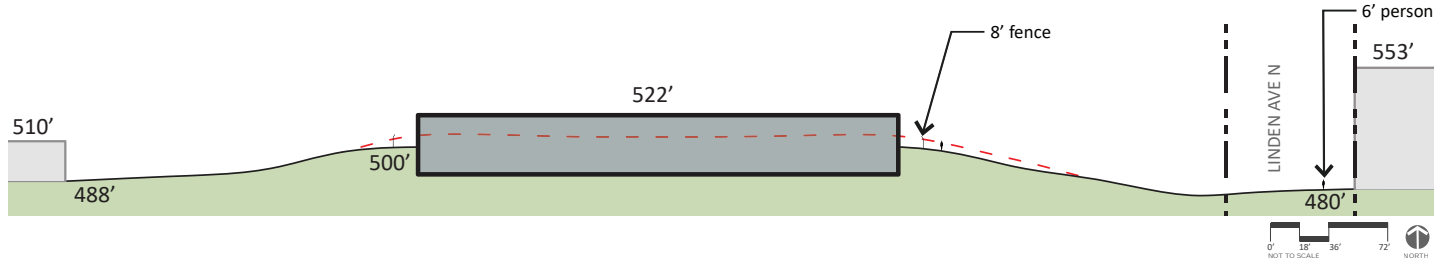

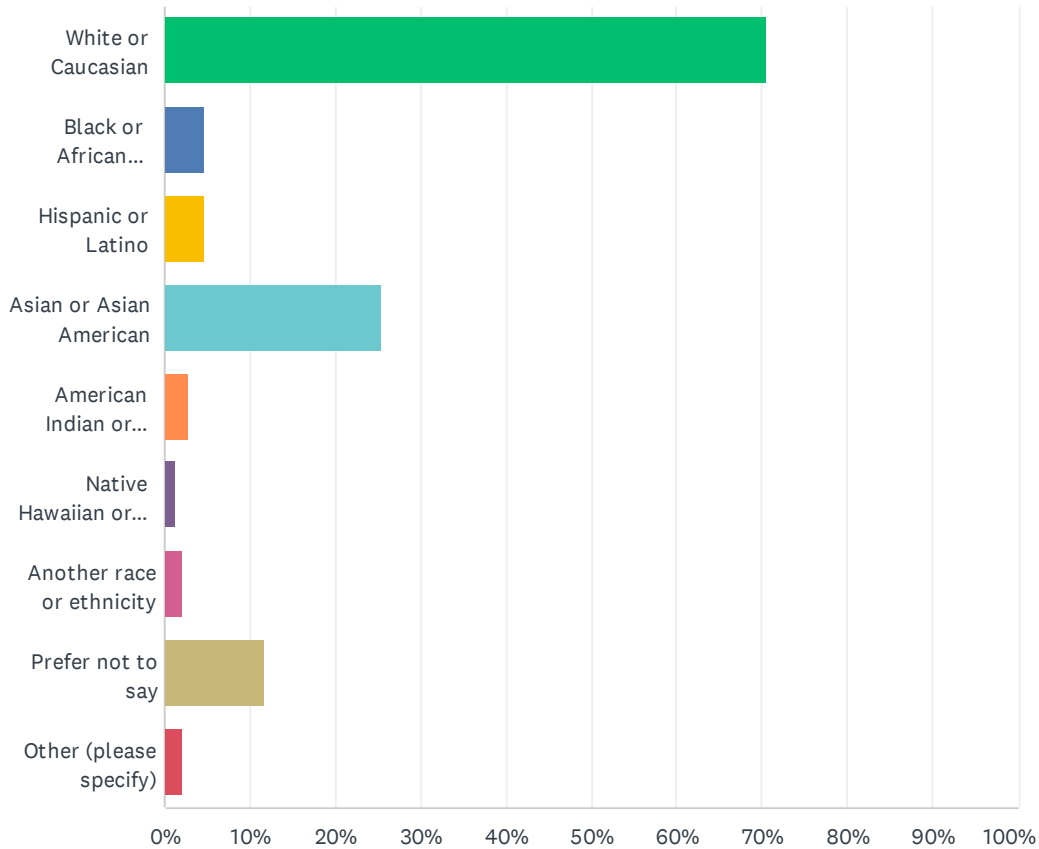
