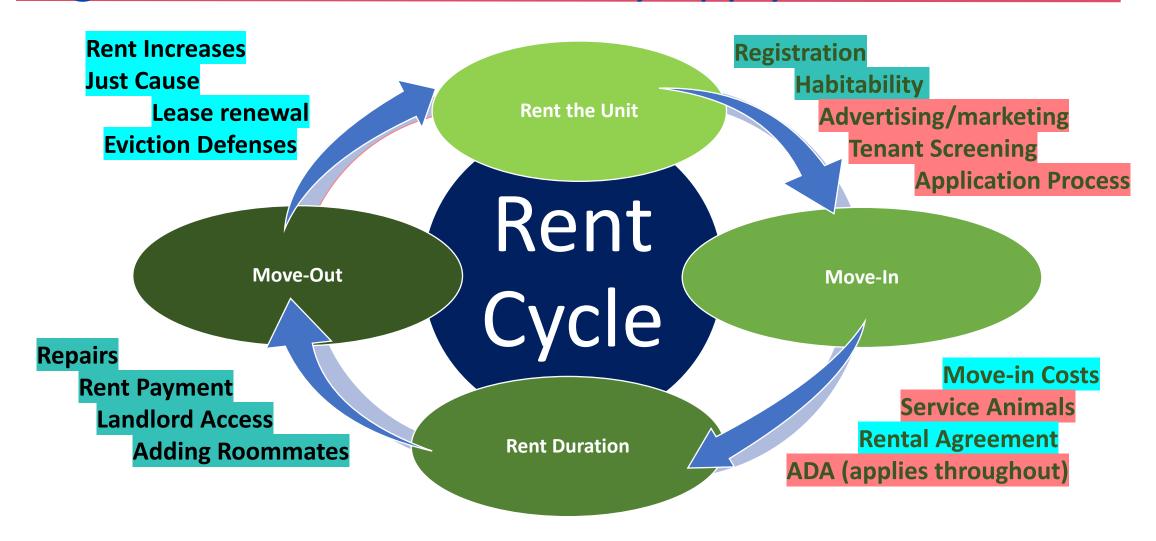

Regulations – Where Do They Apply?



Types of Renter Protections

Rental regulations and fair housing laws in Seattle are some of the most robust tenant protections in the nation

Three Primary Regulatory Schemes

Building/Unit

Habitability, minimum standards, safety, zoning (permitted use), right to occupy

Consumer protections

Contractual, rental agreement, administrative, documents, rules, responsibilities

Civil Rights

Equitable access, protected classes, dismantling institutional racism

Seattle Rental Housing Protections

Compliance Areas

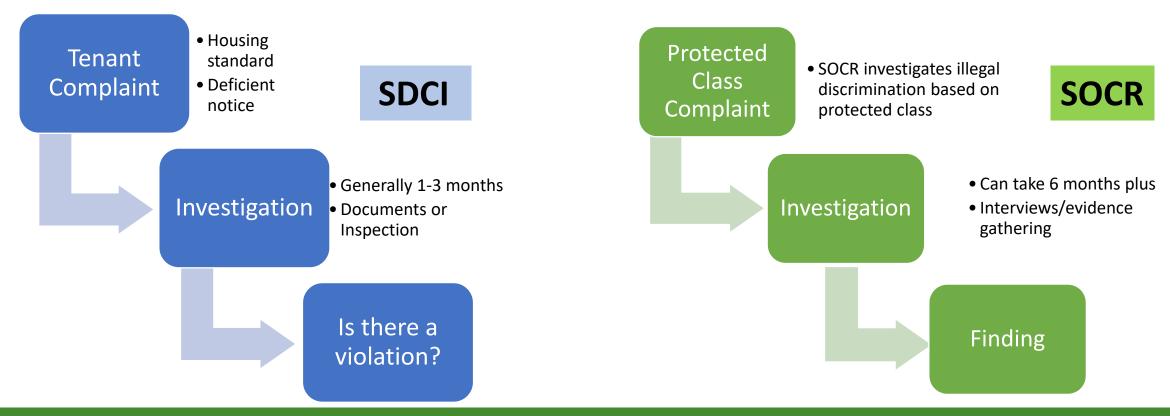

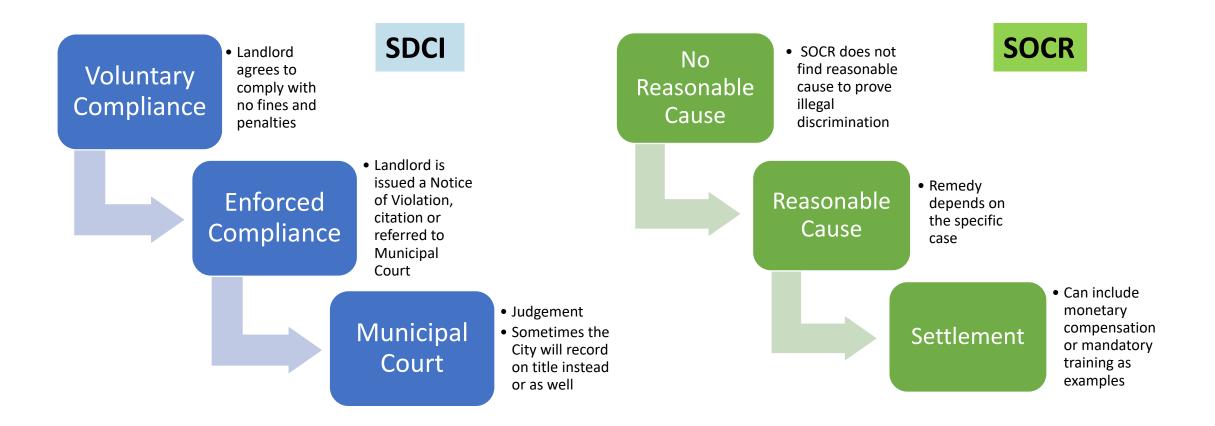
<u>City rental housing laws - intake process</u>

- Departments make requests, provide information, and work within constraints

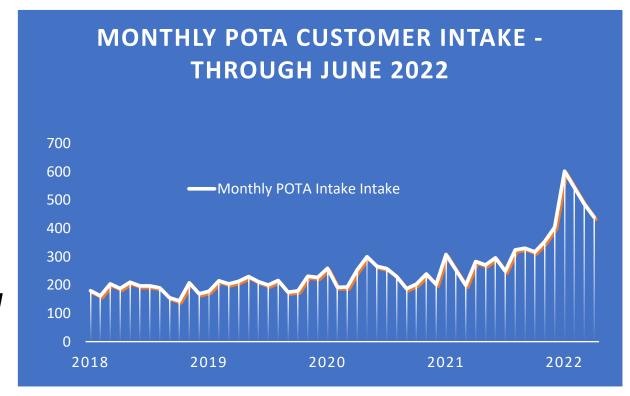

SDCI Code Compliance Team - POTA

What they do -

- Investigate tenant-reported code violations
- Identify compliance requirement
- Provide technical assistance
- Apply enforcement action
- Assist and liaise with Inspection staff on landlord/tenant issues
- Represent SDCI before the Hearing Examiner in appeals
- Administer 2 relocation programs
 - Displacement by development (TRAO Tenant Relocation Assistance Ordinance)
 - Economic displacement by housing cost increase (EDRA Economic Displacement Relocation Assistance)

SDCI Code Compliance Team – Grants & Policy

Grant Management

- SDCI manages \$2.5 million in grants for multiple community providers serving tenants
- Conducts annual RFP process
- Provides training and technical assistance for CSP grantees

Policy Analyst

- Works to harmonize city regulations and state laws
- Analyses code inconsistencies for continual improvement
- Represents department in policy discussions with council and mayor's office staff

SDCI Code Compliance Team - Techs & CA's

Housing and Zoning Techs

- Frontline answer the helpline
- Route callers
- Take complaints
- Prepare intake for referral to correct division
- Make referrals to other City departments or resources

Construction analysts

Manage incoming queries or complaints about construction without a permit

Final Thoughts

SDCI – Code Compliance's goal is to help customers achieve voluntary compliance. Fines and penalties are rarely used tools to enforce against violations when there is no attempt to comply. We achieve a very high standard of voluntary compliance.

- A simple rule of thumb in the landlord/tenant relationship is each party should always consider how the other might feel in any given situation and respond accordingly!
