


NSF Program Overview



- Community-proposed and prioritized transportation projects
- Projects range from \$100k to \$1M
- Move Levy funds three, 3-year cycles: 2016-2018, 2019-2021, and 2022-2024


Typical NSF cycle:



NSF Program Delivery Status

- Completed 12 projects from the 2016-2018 and 2019-2021 cycles with 14 more in process
- On track to deliver 26 projects by the end of 2021, exceeding minimum Levy target of 20-35 projects


- Completed 2016-2018 or 2019-2021 cycle project
- Selected 2016-2018 or 2019-2021 cycle project in process





2019-2021 Cycle Improvements

- In response to LOC feedback, we improved the community prioritization process to be more equitable
- Partnered with Department of Neighborhoods on outreach
- Focused outreach in historically underserved communities, with in-person, in-language events
- Resulted in record number of applications (300+) and participation
- LOC selected 15 projects, majority in Council Districts 1, 2, and 5 and advanced \$2M to fund more projects



2022-2024 Cycle Recommendations

Modified project selection process that leverages outreach from previous cycle:

- Reconsider large pool of unselected project applications submitted in 2019-2021 cycle
- Focus on projects located in geographic equity areas
- No new applications will be considered, no new community prioritization process


Proposed 2022-2024 cycle:

Review 60+ unselected 2019-**Project** Unselected 2019 projects in geographic equity selection Design Construction 2019-2021 areas, no new applications or (by LOC) **Projects** prioritization 2021 2022 2023 2024

2022-2024 Cycle Recommendations

Geographic Equity Areas:

- Include areas of highest need, primarily in Council Districts 1, 2, and 5
- Based on the City's Race and Social Equity Index, Displacement Risk Index, and COVID-19 cases reported by King County
- We will re-review top voted unselected 2019-2021 projects for current eligibility and do outreach with applicants to discuss current interest and potential scope refinements
 - Unselected 2019-2021 cycle project
 - Geographic equity area for 2022-2024 cycle





2022-2024 Cycle Recommendations

Benefits of this approach:

- Leverages previous in-person outreach efforts done in partnership with DON, which may be challenging to replicate due to the current global pandemic
- Avoids the need for community to resubmit and reprioritize projects
- Continues to focus program in historically underserved areas
- Allows for a greater share of funds to go directly to building projects
- May allow some projects to be built early
- Aligns with the 2020 Levy to Move Seattle COVID-19 Impact Assessment

Next Steps

- Seeking concurrence and feedback from LOC on proposed approach
- If supportive, we will re-review applications and do outreach with applicants
- We will report back to the LOC by Q4 2021 with projects for your consideration and eventual selection in early 2022
- We will also communicate the proposed NSF changes to stakeholders and the public
