Interim Director Emery Introduction

Adiam Emery, Interim Director

- Adiam Emery (AE): Thank you for your partnership and collaboration
 - o Bike network is important for us to provide access
 - o It's our responsibility to build and maintain facilities for users of all ages and
 - o Important to complete bike network, especially on the south end
- Questions
 - o Ksenia: within safety, what are the sub-groups of priority
 - AE: continue focus on vulnerable users, LPIs, hardened PBLs, automated traffic enforcement, focus on speeds
 - Ongoing monitoring to make sure we're on track, what's the ROI
 - Ksenia: is banning RTOR part of that plan?
 - AE: we're still piloting, need to socialize importance of safety over congestion

- Doug: SBAB wrote a letter about cameras in school zones and making them operational 24/7 starting August 1st; can we get this done?
 - AE: I agree, this is on our to-do list to evaluate; we have to continue exploring to understand the implications
 - There's a pushback from an equity perspective regarding financial burden on low-income people
 - Doug: we aren't all in agreement about the equity issues, but we believe the overriding focus should be to reduce serious injury and death; VZ has not worked out well so far
- Max: excited about curb hardening and Levy funding; concern about federal funding being rescinded; what's the backup plan if we don't get the federal funding?
 - AE: we're all still calibrating; there are outstanding grants that are questionable; the positive thing about this Levy is that there is less leveraging; new Levy not as heavily dependent on federal grants
- Katy: have heard from national partners that folks are re-thinking how they talk about priorities to make sure we get through the next four years
 - AE: yes, we're thinking about how to word things to make them palatable for this administration
- TJ: noted that AE has biking experience; what is your experience biking around
 Seattle
 - AE: broke some ribs 2 years ago so has been a little nervous about biking; when kids were in elementary school, she commuted only via bike; infrastructure was not as good back then; even now, biking is a bit hairy without infrastructure; now does weekend leisure rides, but pivoting more to transit/walking/biking for commuting
- TJ: new developments with E-Bike subsidies, RTO, high bikeshare; encourage you to use SBAB as a resource; we would love to take you on a ride
- Joseph: given that SDOT is subject to City Council, etc.; how do you think about reducing VMT as part of safety? (e.g. reducing parking, increasing parking costs); is there an opening for that kind of thinking in Seattle?
 - AE: we're a growing city with limited ROW; we don't have the capacity for more SOVs; lead with transit to address the constraints; we're all pedestrians; we have a necessity to reduce the number of SOVs; we need to make your bus ride the most attractive option; we also need to move goods and think about deliveries/curbspace management; 62% of our GHG come from transportation, it's not just about EVs
- Ksenia: how to we help bring people along?
 - AE: it's not going to happen overnight; we have an opportunity with Revive I-5 and FIFA to change behavior; each person's behavior change can come from different situations; free Orca cards
- Max: as a resident, how to provide small suggestions in a way that not's burdensome but also not going into the ether
 - Monica: we're adjusted Find It, Fix It; for longer-term spot improvements, just email staff

- o Doug: Find It, Fix It not working so far
- o Katy: what bike projects are you most excited about?
 - Adiam: GT-SP, Beacon, other south-end possibilities
- o TJ: what's the situation with the 6th Ave Salvation Army street closure?
 - Christiana: we have been working with them on a re-opening plan
 - TJ: could it be a bike/ped only street?
 - Christiana: I can ask, there are also plans for a future ST station
 - TJ: Airport Way is extremely dangerous
- Molly: how can we be a good partner
 - AE: invite us to be a part of what you're doing
- o Ksenia: where are bikes on the prioritization?
 - AE: third; transit, walking, biking; freight is also super important—they restrictions for where they can go; what we cannot afford is having more people driving SOVs

Levy Projects

Katy, Donna, & Molly

Key Issues

Working to understand what is coming down the line in 2025 and overlap with SBAB priorities

Opportunities:

- Sub-committee researches projects in planning and design stages

 - o Opportunity to collaborate with other subcommittees

 - Align on core questions and issues
 - Follow-up as needed

Joseph: Seattle Neighborhood Greenways is another good collaborator

Katy: next step is to develop a process

Joseph: when we know a presentation is coming up, it would be good for SBAB to provide key concerns in advance

Downtown to Georgetown to South Park

TJ, Joseph, & Max

6th Ave Closure

TJ: 6th Ave is an opportunity to provide bike/ped only access

- Company that owns these buildings plans to do retail and housing
- Alternatives to 6th Ave are not good
 - Lots of trucks on Airport Way
- Want to continue providing space for unhoused folks and people dealing with addiction

Lack of Safe Route through Georgetown

Joseph: There is a gap through Georgetown

- DT to GT ends at Lucille
- GT to SP picks up at Bailey/Ellis
- How are bikes supposed to get through? Airport Way?

South Park Gap

Max: There is also a gap in South Park between GT to SP and Green River Trail

- Green River Trail will dump people out onto 14th Ave

TJ: we can point to need to make south end connections

Next steps:

- Sub-committee to ask some questions
- Do a group ride on the new bike routes, including the gaps
 - o Joseph: yes, these are like Cascade's "policy rides"

 - o Christiana: New intersection design guidance
