"The days of planners drawing lines and telling people what 90 they get are over." 91 Make Seattle "more walkable, bikeable, and greener" 92 First initiative: Review of Vision Zero efforts 93 94 Q: What has been an unexpected comment you heard or experience you had with transit in the last 16 days?-- Reese McMichael 95 A: I heard loud and clear that there's a desire for more safety; why I asked for a vision zero overview. Specific concerns around Aurora 96 and Rainier. 97 Q: Are there particular areas that are high on your list, and where on that list is the First Avenue streetcar?-- McKenna Lux 98 A: On streetcar: There is a funded study in the 2023 budget. Given the context of a downtown that hasn't rebounded to pre-pandemic 99 100 crowds and high work-from-home rates in Seattle, initial belief that this project could support much-needed vitality downtown. On other topics: We need investment in North Seattle (e.g. new sidewalks, pedestrian safety along Aurora) and South Seattle 101 (concern around high concentration of pedestrian deaths). 102

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Q: Lessons that Seattle could learn from LA and Southern California? -- Chris Miller

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- 104 A: One example: Embracing low- and no-emissions vehicles in municipal transportation fleet.
- 105 Q: Are you thinking about any actions you might take through administrative rules?—Erin Tighe
- A: Looking at enforcement around parking regulations; notes an example where a resident has marked off a "parking space" on
- public right of way and is charging fees for it.
- 108 Q: How do you think about working better with Seattle City Light?--Sandro Pani
- A: In LA, became "a very skilled administrator"; has experience forging relationships across departments. "I want to build mutually supportive partnerships both with the city and the county."

Updates

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- On Sept 27, West Seattle Bridge reopened, allowing buses to resume previous routes
- Fall service changes went into effect
 - Primary changes were related to lack of driver resources
 - o Service Changes maintained existing service levels, though frequency has decreased on some routes.
- On Sept 27, draft budget went to the council for review
 - Of note: there is a proposed increase in the capital spending cap from \$3m to \$6M. SDOT is working on a plan for what to do with that increase
- Seattle Transportation Plan is holding workshops to solicit public feedback
- Cliff will be moving from to Minnesota; will continue in role as liaison to TAB until the position can be back-filled
