



West Seattle High-Rise Bridge Safety Program



Reconnect West Seattle

- Achieve a reconnected West Seattle peninsula that has similar levels of travel across the Duwamish to those seen before the closure of the High-Rise Bridge
- Reduce impacts to communities in the Duwamish Valley
- Project dashboard to track projects

Home Zone

What is it? A holistic and cost-effective approach to encouraging slower vehicle speeds and making residential streets more walkable within a neighborhood. Examples:


- Traffic circles
- Speed humps
- Cost-effective walkways
- Activation and beautification
- Treatments coordinated with other City departments



Additional Improvements


What is it? Connecting pedestrians from one area to another safely along and across arterial streets. Examples:

- Sidewalk repair
- Street trees
- Crossing improvements
- Traffic signals
- Transit spot improvements



Where are the Home Zones?

- Focus on neighborhoods along WSB detour routes:
 - South Park
 - Highland Park
 - Georgetown




Community Engagement Process

- Due to community traffic concerns,
 Reconnect West Seattle allocated
 \$1.5M for each Home Zone
- Engagement with community organizations (HPAC, Georgetown CC, SPNA)
- Community walks in October 2020
- Neighborhood-specific Home Zone survey

Final Home Zone Plan - Highland Park/Riverview

- New painted curb bulbs
- New walkway
- New radar speed feedback sign
- Spot pavement repair
- Remove existing flashing beacon and crosswalk

- Speed hump/cushion
- Existing Stay Healthy
 Street* and Neighborhood
 Greenway
- Evaluate for intersection upgrades
- Wheel stops curbing and conveyance swales

- Bus stop upgrades
- Selected HP-RiverviewNeighborhood Greenway
- Flashing beacon
- New pedestrian signal and crosswalk
- Evaluate for additional traffic calming



Project Highlights

- New speed cushions on routes used by freight:
 - SW Holden St 16th to Delridge
 - 9th Ave SW Trenton to Portland
 - 16th Ave SW Henderson to Holden
 - Dallas Ave S 10th to 14th
- New arterial all-way stop at 8th Ave S & S Henderson St
- Painted curb bulbs at arterial intersections (SW Holden St, 9th Ave SW, Corson & EMW)
- Proposed new signal at 14th Ave S & Dallas Ave S
- Proposed new signal at SW Holden St and 12th Ave SW (removal of RRFB at 11th Ave SW)
- Radar feedback signs on Ellis Ave S and Corson Ave S
- New walkway on 6th Ave S between S Michigan St and S Orcas St
- New Stay Healthy Streets in South Park and Georgetown

Next Steps

• Q1 2021

- ✓ Present final Home Zone plan to communities
- ☐ Continue outreach with stakeholder groups and community organizations
- ☐ Begin Home Zone project design

• Q2-Q4 2021

- ☐ Implement priority projects and engage neighbors on construction plan
- ☐ Continue neighborhood collaboration on long-term improvements
