

Survey Purpose:

In February 2024, we shared an online survey with the public to better understand existing conditions, the community's needs, and to gather feedback about our initial proposed on-street parking plan for the area around the future Judkins Park Light Rail Station area.




Survey - Outreach

The survey opened February 16 and closed March 25, 2024.

We shared the survey in a variety of ways:

- a mailed flyer to all addresses in the area
- an SDOT <u>blog post</u> and social media posts (picked up by <u>local news</u>)
- City and neighborhood contacts
- Project website

The survey was available in nine languages: English, the City of Seattle's Tier 1 languages, and Tigrinya.





Survey Design

The survey included our proposal and some basic information about RPZs and other parking restrictions.

We asked questions to learn more about:

- Support for project goals
- Resident vehicle ownership/ parking practices
- Resident support for an RPZ
- Non-resident transportation use
- Support for adding time-limited parking next to non-residential locations
- Areas where load zones are needed

The survey also included open fields for general comments.












Q3: Residents only: Do you live north or south of I-90?



Q4: Residents only: Do you have a car that you keep at your home?





Q6: Residents only: Do you live in one of the areas depicted in the map below? (map in survey depicted proposed project area)



Q7: Residents in proposal area only: Do you think it would be a good idea to have a Restricted Parking Zone and signs on your street to help manage parking?










Q9: Employees only: Where do you work? Choose the option that best describes your workplace:



Q10: Employees only: What hours do you usually work in the Judkins Park area? Please choose the option that best describes your work schedule:



Q11: Non-employee visitors only: Do you usually travel north or south of I-90 for your trips to the area?











Q13: Non-residents only: How do you currently travel to and from the area?

Q14: Non-residents only: If you sometimes drive to the area, where do you usually park? Answered: 125 Skipped: 460


