The force of that sun's attraction transformed those streets and the lives of their neighbors, forever. This is a true story of transformation, based on the work of two exceptional people committed to art and social justice.	3rd Grade
<u>My Footprints*</u>	Bao Phi	Every child feels different in some way, but Thuy feels "double different." She is Vietnamese American and she has two moms. Thuy walks home one winter afternoon, angry and lonely after a bully's taunts. Then a bird catches her attention and sets Thuy on an imaginary exploration. What if she could fly away like a bird? What if she could sprint like a deer, or roar like a bear? Mimicking the footprints of each creature in the snow, she makes her way home to the arms of her moms. Together, the three of them imagine beautiful and powerful creatures who always have courage - just like Thuy.	3rd Grade
