5:45	Guest Speaker: "Wrestling with the Truth of Colonization" Training Intro	Miskanhk
	This is a 10-hour training (five 2-hour online sessions) for non-Indigenous peoples, reviewing the impacts (historical and contemporary) of colonization on Indigenous peoples. The training began around 5 years ago. It involves small and large group time. The MMIW Subcommittee recommends SWC participation and to open the training to all Commissions, with the training beginning in Q1 2024. They will share additional details, including a budget proposal, soon.

	Affordable Childcare: requests approval to provide public testimony in favor of the Mayor's budget investment in human services workers' wages.	
	R. Bryant makes a motion endorsing K. Evans to testify on behalf of SWC at the 10/18/23 budget hearing in support of	

increasing wages for human services staff, seconded by K. Guerrero. Unanimous approval (by all seven Commissioners).	
Housing access: has shifted their event to be after the election (11/15/23) to avoid any confusion or possible issues regarding the housing levy on the ballot. Commissioners are encouraged to share the event flyer, invite people, and attend the event.

ASL and/or CART will be provided at the event. Marta will ask the venue if they have a screen and the ability to provide a hybrid meeting. All panelists are confirmed to participate in-person.	
 Co-Chair Updates Domestic Violence Council Representative Voting on SPD Letter (<u>9/11/23 incident</u>) SWC <u>Coffee Chats</u> 	K. Guerrero
We need a new SWC representative for the next DVPC meeting on December 1 st (most recently it was Tana in this role). Marta shared some context about the Council and the SWC's participation. Anyone interested in participating is encouraged to reach out to SWC Co-Chairs.	
The DVPC operates under the joint sponsorship of the Executive, Law, and Legislative branches of City government to: (1) foster interdepartmental collaboration in the City's domestic violence response; (2) develop recommendations regarding the City's domestic violence policies within a regional framework; (3) explore innovative approaches employed in other jurisdictions to address domestic violence; (4) determine program effectiveness through program monitoring and evaluation; (5) promote an integrated approach to budgeting for domestic violence services; (6) coordinate interdepartmental efforts to obtain grant funding and recommend the allocation of such funds; and (7) be an	

	active participant in the community's response to domestic violence.
