| 1/20 | <p>Seattle Women's March 2.0 "A time to Make History again and Be the Change!"</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Everything went well but it was a scramble to get things together; Organizer did not order any of the hard closure barricade signs; SPD requested hard barricade closures for route (safety and concerns); Barricade company placed signs without full payment; SDOT worked with organizer from get go for plan of street closures and no parks - Organizers were in communication weeks before event but then days before the event they were not in communication - No parking signs for metro and extra SPD staffing were not out in time for the signs to be validated - There were reserved spaces for the Fire Station on 4th Ave; SDOT not sure if those were placed - Uber and ride share zones had reserved stalls and those worked and were clearly marked - Charter buses staged on 6th Ave near Seattle Center; Staging went well - Near Cal Anderson it was congested; Charter buses went up Capitol Hill despite instructions not to send them there for drop off - Metro, National Barricade and SDOT – A lot of staff hours to get the event to work out at the last minute; agencies scrambled all together at the last minute to get everything to work despite organizer's delayed action - Metro was still operating Saturday; Everything downtown had to be rerouted throughout their base station - Chair will reach out to full committee on feedback about organizer since there have been a lot of reoccurring problems with events coordinated by this organizer; Will ask for suggestions and comments - DON received no complaints from neighbors or impacted neighborhoods - Parks saw lack communication between organizers; port-o-potties were not ordered until day before event; Payment for the park was not made until night before event; No problems in parks or clean up after event |

Location: UW, Seattle Center, Lake Union Park
Organizer(s): Eric Corning, Josh Wilkens

Event Notes:

- Event dates: July 1-6, 2018
- Athletes housed at UW, working with UW and UW police
- Schedule of events and activities
 - Competitions will take place on UW campus and other non-City locations; events and activity on City property as noted here
 - Law Enforcement Torch Run Final Leg – June 28- July 1; Currently working out route in Seattle; About 35-40 participants running 2 x 2 for ½ a mile on the road; Requesting escort
 - Welcome Day – June 28-29; Approximately 4,000 athletes, families and fans; Athletes will take light rail to UW campus; Shuttle buses will be waiting at UW campus
 - Opening ceremony - July 1, 12:30 – 3pm at Husky Stadium; Broadcasted ABC/ESPN; expected attendance about 30,000; Using the model of UW graduation for planning and expecting to fill lower bowl of Husky Stadium
 - Future of Inclusion Forum – July 2
 - Special Olympics Town – July 1-5
 - Fan Zone – July 1-6
 - Healthy Athletes – July 1-6
 - Young Athletes Festival – July 2-3, 10am- 2pm at Seattle Center; Obstacle course for young athletes ages 2-7; Looking to use some of Republican St, map and info forthcoming
 - Youth Leadership Experience – July 2-5
 - Unified Sports Experiences – July 2-3
 - Independence Day – July 4
 - Closing Ceremony – July 6 Lake Union Park; Stage will be a floating barge anchored to Lake Union Park; Possibility of having floating cauldron on a separate barge; Looking at closure of Valley from Westlake Ave N to Fairview Ave N from 5pm – 12am
- Events happening at UW will be in walking distance; Will have some shuttle buses around campus for those who need it; No other traffic impacts near UW campus
- Using the sports fields at UW; Seattle University sports fields and gym; Largest impact to the city would be closing ceremony at Lake Union Park
- Multiple events happening on private locations and at gyms; there will be some parking requests and street closures for bus drop off and load in and shuttle hub at UW, maps and info forthcoming

Committee Discussion:

FMO – Met with event organizers a couple of weeks ago; Working directly with organizers

KC Metro – Working directly with organizer; A lot of events happening around UW during the summer, e.g. Amazon also brings interns to work in the summer and are housed at UW dorms; Will work to maintain regular service to SLU in conjunction with shuttle buses; Metro will have ambassadors at the Closing Ceremony events to help guide the public and get them around

DON – Suggests working with U District partnership/ U District community council and U Village; Organization partnered with Visit Seattle

SDOT – Requesting separate subcommittee meeting with SE and Metro to talk buses, parking, and staging; Closure of Valley will have traffic re-routed to Mercer; Hopeful not to much impact to traffic

Parks – March 9th will have Special Olympics USA present to the Parks working meeting for the use of Lake Union Park; Fencing should be down by event

Health – Food trucks at closing ceremony and fan zone will need annual permit and access to running water and handwashing stations; Organizers state most of the food is with Fare Start partnership with Amazon and/or provided by UW

FAS – Will need a list of food trucks and caters and supply/rental vendors

SPD – Working directly with organizers; Capt. Sean O’Donnell will be in charge of event; Organizer working with UW Police in addition to SPD; SPD command center will be located on campus

Chair – Request application submitted by early March; Will continue working with organizers during planning stage through event

Event: SPF30 Sub Pop Records 30th Anniversary Festival
Date(s): Saturday August 11, 2018
Location: Alki Beach
Organizer(s): Kara Mattaini, Mason Sherry, Megan Jasper, Jonathan Poneman, Steven Martin, Gabe Carter

Event Notes:

- Event Date: August 11, 2018; 12pm – 10pm
- 30th Anniversary free concert event
- Festival is a thank you for the city and fans from Seattle’s SubPop Records and its artists
- Partnering with SW Seattle Historical Society, Puget SoundKeeper, WS Blog, and more
- Aiming for a zero waste festival; Organizers want to leave the space better than before they got there
- Aligning with Pearl Jam’s two August stadium concerts for a week of charitable events in Seattle
- Alki Ave street closure 57th to 63rd; 4 stages – 2 stages on either side of Alki bathhouse; One stage on 57th and one at Whale tail playfield; 57th St stage closed at sundown
- Closure of street 6pm the night before (a block of 57th) to help with the load in of the stage
- 16 confirmed bands
- Beer gardens within footprint of event; Planning to have three total
- Providing recycling and clean up services in house
- Keeping the bus loop open; bus routes use the loop; Metro needs a cone lane and they can use for bus traffic
- Currently speaking with the Port of Seattle to use CEM lot (on Harbor Ave north of WS Bridge) for parking; will have shuttles, trolley, or bike share partnership to get to event; Looking to establish parking and shuttles or trolleys from other key spots in West Seattle
- Communication with businesses/neighborhood have started; Engaging with SW Seattle Historical Society, West Seattle Junction Association, Alki Community Council; WS Blog announced the event earlier this month
- Renting Alki Community Center to have public meeting for neighbors, businesses within the next month
- Will go door to door with fliers and introducing themselves; Website and social media outlets will be used to promote event
- Organizers will discuss with committee the possible closure of 59th between Alki to Whale tail park

Committee Discussion:

SPD Traffic – Concerned about traffic flow to, from, and around event; General traffic during that summer months will make it hard to get trolley and shuttles to the venue; concerned about shuttle mobility if there is already gridlocked traffic; Concerned that the few ways to get into Alki Beach (West Seattle Bridge, I-5, and SR99) will all see traffic delays; Organizers will strongly be encouraging water taxi and bike share companies; SE and Organizers are already exploring transportation partnerships to relieve mobility issues

SDOT – Suggests closing Alki Ave from California like they do for other Alki events; Rideshare vehicles could drop off at California lane closure, WS Water Taxi can be utilized; Organizer needs to show transportation partnership opportunities during the planning phase

KC Metro – Route 50 services area is every half hour and there is only a max of 35; Unable to change to a larger bus because of route; street closure plan will work

Citizen Rep Oliver Little– Has seen firsthand from his events, Seafair Pirate Landing, that there isn't a good way to get everyone in; Non-vehicle options highly recommended, or attendance may be impacted

FMO – Street map plan looks sufficient; still need vendor and food lists for review and approval

DON – Great community plan in place; Continue outreach and communication with groups and neighbors

SDCI – Will contact STG if temporary construction permit will be needed for the stage(s)

WSLCB – Will work with organizers to ensure they have the correct liquor licensing; Will need to have map of beer garden showing dimension

SPU – Organizer will self-hauling with extra bins; request to contact SPU if extra signage for bins are needed; Reminder of the single use plastic bag ban

Parks – Parks are booked and stage locations look good; A little concerned about the turf at Alki Playfield; Consider building it last and taking down first

SDCI Noise - No sound checks before 9am

Health – Food trucks need to have licenses and proper hand washing stations available

FAS – Event has enough vendors to qualify for a tradeshow license; will reach out in July for a list of vendors

SEO – Provide formal public safety and event management plan; Reminder Insurance documents due 30 days before event

Chair – Will convene separate subcommittee meeting with SPD traffic, SPD SW Precinct, KC Metro, and SDOT to discuss traffic mobility concerns and partnerships/set up to best address them

Event: Hot Sauce Fest
Date(s): Saturday August 18, 2018
Location: Ballard
Organizer(s): Amy Faulkner

Event Notes:

- Event Date: August 18, 2018
- Same event and footprint as the 2017 Ballard Burrito Festival
- Same event footprint but using a little bit more of the park
- Looking at extended closure of 57th Ave NW
- Potential small change to 2018 event - a community group is applying for a neighborhood grant to do a movie after the event; If this goes through them more coordination will be done to accommodate request

Committee Discussion:

FMO – Last year was a problem with vendors and the way they were parked; Make sure that is address prior to event; Will need list of vendors prior to event; As of now the beer garden allows 499 occupancies

DON – Request organizer add no-parking information and street closure location and times to the neighborhood notification letter

SDOT – Taking the parking lane of 57th Ave NW will be able to maintain both directions of traffic; Will need pedestrian barricades or candle sticks to help keep pedestrians out of traffic lane

Parks – Last year there were spray painted stencils on the sidewalk which needed to pressure washed off the sidewalks by Parks staff; please remind vendors this is not allowable

Health – Food trucks will need current annual permit; Appropriate restrooms and hot water hand washing stations are needed

FAS – Number of vendors qualify for tradeshow license for event; Will reach out to organizers for list of

vendors closer to the event date

SEO – If organizer umbrella’s the movie under their permit and it will have amplified sound past 10pm, notify the Special Events Office with updated permit application information; Organizer will need to work with SDCI Noise Abatement for a Temporary Noise Variance, which includes getting sign-offs from impacted neighbors; Request organizer complete and submit Public Safety and Event Management Plan

Chair – Requests organizer to inform SEO and DON about organization requesting movie night funding

Event: Borealis Festival of Light
Date(s): Wednesday October 10 – Sunday October 14, 2018
Location: Lake Union Park
Organizer(s): Terry Morgan, Jeff Mason, Margaret Nicoll

Event Notes:

- Event Date: October 10 – 14, 2018
- Brand new event in Seattle, SLU neighborhood; 5 nightly showings
- Started with an idea of adding some light mapping downtown; Turned into a festival concept with the use of music, street art, lighting art, video mappers and projection mapping on buildings to transform surrounding built environments of landmark buildings and facades into a virtual reality extravaganza
- Light artist and shows/festivals happening in Europe and beyond
- Worked out relationship with MOHAI to have event at Lake Union Park
- Continuing to explore avenue of artist and sources to this event
- Media sponsors on board with event - Seattle Times, Hubbard Broadcasting, Sinclair Broadcasting, KOMO TV, and others
- Free event and open to the public to help promote the arts and education to community and sponsors
- Working on regulated date and time admission so organizers can help manage crowds; Will need to have a fencing component to help regulate the crowd
- Working with Plymouth Housing
- In addition to the Park activities, assembling a walking tour through SLU; Working with Amazon to include parts of their campus; Will have maps of the neighborhood for participants

Committee Discussion:

Citizen Representative – Need traffic plan for congestions; SLU area gets congested with everyday traffic; Organizers state they are promoting it as a walking festival and scheduling the first showing would be around 6:30pm after rush hour

FMO – Requests a map that shows entrance and exiting; There should be no setup on Terry, people can be there but no set up since it will be a part of the 20 ft fire lane; Requesting a detailed map and dimensions of beer garden for occupancy and approval; List of vendors and food trucks needed prior to event

DON – Recommends organizers contact SLU Community Council which has a transportation sub committee meeting that would be a place to start before this event; Could be a partnership opportunity

WSLCB – Detailed map showing dimensions of the beer garden is needed for approval; Will work with organizers to ensure caters or vendors have proper licensing

SDOT – Requests information on any sidewalk space needed for projecting on Amazon properties; Set up on Amazon Plaza will help with the pedestrian crowd; SDOT will work with organizers to identify ride share drop zones; Consider partnerships with different parking garages in the area

Parks – MOHAI Working Group meets monthly- organizers should attend the meeting and work with the group for planning of the event

Health – Food trucks will need current annual permit; Appropriate restrooms and hot water hand washing

stations are needed

FAS – “Suggested donation” is considered a donation (a dollar amount is then subjected to the admission tax); Vendors will each need to have Seattle Business License

SE – Reminder insurance documents due 30 days before event; Will distribute map of park to committee; Requesting detailed maps showing dimensions and set of alcohol area needed

Committee Review: Capitol Hill Pride Festival and PrideFest Capitol Hill Special Event Permit Applications

Procedure

- The Special Events Office received two individual Special Event Permit applications for events requesting the same location, date and time
- Chair moved for committee review and vote; SDOT representative seconded the motion

 - Capitol Hill Pride Festival March and Rally
 - Application received 2/7/2018
 - Event Date: Saturday June 23, 2018, 10am – 11am
 - Rally assembles at Seattle Central Campus; march travels northbound on Broadway Ave, finishes at Capitol Hill Pride Festival main stage at Harrison St
 - PrideFest Capitol Hill
 - Application received 2/1/2018
 - Event Date: Saturday June 23, 2018, 11am – 10pm
 - Requesting closure of Broadway from John St to Roy Street with booth activation; closure of Denny way from 10th Ave to Broadway and Cal Anderson Park with booth activation and activities

Background

- Capitol Hill Pride Festival was permitted from 2008 through 2016
- In 2017, Capitol Hill Pride Festival organizer violated permit conditions on a separate Special Event Permit resulting in unsafe conditions and resulting in an injury to a passer by
- Because of the permit violations, Special Events Committee denied the Capitol Hill Pride Festival permit
- After Capitol Hill Pride Festival permit was denied, Broadway BIA reached out to PrideFest, who applied, were approved for, and executed a Special Event Permit for event activity for the same date, with similar street use footprint and time

Committee Discussion

SDOT

Capitol Hill Pride Festival

- Capitol Hill Pride Festival organizers have always been challenging; organizer has been particularly challenging for the last 3 years by wanting to extend their footprint on Broadway; Use of current space has not been utilized well for the number of vendors and activation; Most of attendees and attraction are focused near Thomas St
- In 2017 Capitol Hill Pride Festival organizers submitted two applications for free speech events on June 10 and 11, 2017; The City permitted those events as marches with no street closures or vendors; SPD assigned a significant amount of resources to escort march; Several days before the event date, organizers erected no-parking signs placed on Broadway which occupied 5 blocks, had port-a-potties delivered, and ordered street closure signs; Despite repeated communication in advance from SDOT and SEO, organizers were setting up outside of what was approved for the free speech march and rally
- On June 10th the organizers had a stage constructed on the sidewalk which was blocking a large amount of the sidewalk, and vendors were present and setting up on the sidewalk, all of which were outside of permit conditions and violations; SDOT worked to dismantle vendors, stage, and sound; An elderly woman tripped over the cord cover from the set up from the stage and was taken to the hospital; the march had an attendance of four participants including organizers Charlette LeFevre and Philip Lipson
- Street use issued a notice of violation, Capitol Hill Pride Festival organizers appealed the violation, which was reviewed by the hearing examiner; examiner denied organizers' appeal and directed them to pay the citation/fine

PrideFest Capitol Hill

- PrideFest and Egan did a great job of jumping in to produce 2017 event with the support from Broadway BIA, Capitol Hill businesses and other event organizers; His events have gone smoothly in the past; He also takes into consideration the impacts to transportation

DON

Capitol Hill Pride Festival

- Did not see support from Broadway businesses for Capitol Hill Pride Festival; did not appear they had buy off from the businesses or support from them
- Capitol Hill Pride Festival used longevity of event for their notifications; Neighborhood is changing, there are a lot new residents, businesses and people in the area

PrideFest Capitol Hill

- DON cares about the impact to businesses and residence; PrideFest event was much more supported by the businesses and residents
- In 2017 PrideFest had a very short period of time to perform notification since they took over the event two weeks before event date; even with that short timeframe they did a good job and we received positive feedback

SPU

Capitol Hill Pride Festival

- Capitol Hill Pride Festival has had a historical year-to-year record of lack of resources for pre/post-event setup and cleanup; SPU received significant calls, letters, etc. about post-event clean up by community members, businesses, and the public

PrideFest Capitol Hill

- PrideFest had clear communication with SPU and between vendors Recology and Waste Management; There was a significant increase of clean up during and post event; PrideFest helped improve the conditions in this area

SPD Operations

- Defer to SPD Traffic for comment regarding each event
- If we are dedicating a significant amount of SPD resources to an event, then should go with PrideFest instead of Capitol Hill Pride Festival

SPD Traffic

Capitol Hill Pride Festival

- 2017 Capitol Hill March and Rally stated an expected attendance of about 2,000 but actual attendance was four people; Organizers' expected attendance for both free speech events were drastically off
- In years past, Capitol Hill Pride Festival has often inflated the expected attendance which causes SPD to unnecessarily up-staff for event

PrideFest Capitol Hill

- PrideFest has a much more realistic view of expected attendance of the event
- In favor of Egan and PrideFest for 2018 event

KC Metro

Capitol Hill Pride Festival

- Metro representative was involved in the first year's initial planning for the Capitol Hill Pride Festival event starting in 2008; Each year metro has struggled to allow access to Broadway and provide transit to event because of organizer's refusal to work with permitted conditions
- There was no balance from event organizers and Metro - some years no parks were not set up, sometimes they were, sometimes timing was off so the notification from metro was thrown off

PrideFest Capitol Hill

- PrideFest always considered accessibility and impact to Metro to events they produce; Organizers wanted to make it easy so attendees could get there and get through easily

Citizen Representative 1

PrideFest Capitol Hill

- Volunteered to help with event production with PrideFest; Obvious from the start there were overlap in sound, footprint, etc from many Capitol Hill businesses involved
- PrideFest and Egan helped mitigate some of the issues that came up, listened to each individual business and the needs that came up with their participation in the festival

Seattle Center

PrideFest Capitol Hill

- Worked with PrideFest and Egan for Seattle Center events; always good to work with
- Agrees that Egan worked well to keep in mind metro, transportation and closures when planning his events

FMO

Capitol Hill Pride Festival

- Every year Capitol Hill Pride Festival did not maintain 20’ fire lanes; FMO would constantly need to make changes on site during festival year after year; There was often no event representatives available on site the day of event to provide help with changes
- Capitol Hill Pride Festival repeatedly at least 3-4 vendors without proper licenses; Would have to work with vendors and organizers day of event; on several occasions organizer LeFevre would get into an argument with a vendor about proper licensing in front of attendees and FMO Rep

PrideFest Capitol Hill

- PrideFest had representatives posted at different spots within footprint the day of event to help mitigate issues with set up; always available when needed
- No issues with event layout; everything was exactly as diagramed in their application maps
- In 2017 PrideFest was able to give list of vendors in the short time frame and was very cooperative to make sure all vendors had proper licenses
