Food Equity Fund (Department of Neighborhoods)

General Grant

- Closed March 15.
- Community review process underway with 9 leaders.
- Applicants will hear results by mid June.

Food Equity Fund (Department of Neighborhoods)

Capacity Building Grant

- Will open May 1.
- Geared towards organizations with less than \$500k annual budget.
- Awards up to \$20k.
- Applications accepted on a rolling basis.

Fresh Bucks (Office of Sustainability & Environment)

Released its 2022 Impact Report. Highlights:

- 12,000 Seattle households redeemed \$4.6 million in fruit and vegetable benefits in 2022
- 41 retail partners and 19 local community-based partners helped us to serve communities most impacted by food insecurity and health disparities
- We welcomed **two new small businesses** into the Fresh Bucks retail network, <u>Central Co-Op</u> and the program's first grocery delivery provider, <u>Local Yokels</u>.

Farm to Preschool (Human Services Department)

 CAB member input is requested on success and goals of the F2P program. Information will be used to refine the theory of change and inform what and how the program collects data moving forward.

Food Action Plan (citywide coordination of food policy and programs)

• Community engagement to update the Plan has wrapped up. We are designing what ongoing engagement will look like.

 A complete draft of the updated Food Action Plan is being reviewed by policy advisors in the Mayor's office and Tribal governments.

We intend to release the updated Plan later this year.
