





Background: Problem

- Block the box and transit lane violations have a negative impact on mobility, safety, and emergency response
- SDOT field observation at just one location (4th and Battery) in January 2018 showed:
 - Block the Box: average of 6 violations per day, high of 53
 - **Transit Lane**: average of 361 violations per day, high of 418
- Manual UPO enforcement is resource intensive and often further obstructs traffic





Background: Existing Framework

- The City already has authority to use automated cameras for red light, school speed zone, and railroad crossing violations
- Must post notice 30 days prior to installation and provide a 30 day grace period afterward
- State law includes significant privacy protections:
 - May not capture the driver or passenger's face in photos
 - May not retain photos for longer than is necessary
 - May not use photos for legal proceedings beyond the specific violations







City Proposal

- Expanded automated enforcement authority for all local governments to include:
 - Blocking the box
 - Transit lanes
 - Obstructing portions of the street reserved for emergency response vehicles
- Expanded permissible locations for cameras to include mid-block on arterials
