

# **Today's Overview**

- The Seattle Department of Construction and Inspections (SDCI) is responsible for routine maintenance of the Land Use and other codes.
- The proposed amendments generally include "clean-up" amendments that correct inadvertent clerical errors, incorrect cross-references, and clarify existing Code language. Our amendments also include relatively minor policy changes that do not warrant independent legislation.
- The proposed amendments are called "omnibus" amendments because SDCI packages a collection of amendments for efficiency that are relatively small scale.
- The need for these amendments were identified by residents, elected officials, and City staff.

- Environmental review (SEPA) for the code amendments is complete. The comment period closed on May 9, 2024.
- City Council will hold a hearing on the proposed omnibus amendments for adoption in the 3rd quarter of 2024.

### Tree Protection Code (SMC 25.11) Omnibus Items

**25.11.020 Exemptions-** Changes to section 25.11.020 to clarify the existing tree removal exemption that applies in Environmentally Critical Areas and provide correct code reference to the process for approval in Section 25.09.070.

**25.11.030** Emergency actions- Changes to section to 25.11.030 to provide correct reference to the qualifications and industry standard for Tree Risk Assessments consistent with Ordinance 126821.

**25.11.040 - Hazardous tree removal** – Amendment subsection 25.11.040.B.3 to clarify that normal and routine pruning shall be completed to mitigate hazards. Provides consistency with definitions in subsection 25.11.130, which require consistency with ANSI standards.

### Tree Protection Code (SMC 25.11) Omnibus Items

**25.11.050** General provisions for regulated tree categories — Updates to Table A for 25.11.050 are provided to correctly implement tree removal regulations in Neighborhood Residential, Lowrise, Midrise, commercial, and Seattle Mixed Zones, to provide corrected reference notation and provide correct code references. Include clarifying footnote 1 that indicates which zones that table does not apply.

**25.11.060** Requirements for trees when development is proposed -- Changes to section 25.11.060 to provide corrected reference to indicate which portion of the Tree Protection Area may be reduced by the Director consistent with the language in Ordinance 126821.

# 25.11.070 Tree protection on sites undergoing development in Neighborhood Residential, Lowrise, Midrise, commercial, and Seattle Mixed zones:

- Subsection 25.11.070.A.2 to provide clarity around reducing yards and setbacks in order to voluntarily protect Tier 1,2,3 and 4 trees.
- Subsection 25.11.070.A.3 address the calculation of maximum lot coverage and that minimum width of structure that must be able to be achieved in order to determine of a tree may be removed.
- Subsection 25.11.070.B.2.b to clarify that developments identified are for low income housing meeting the definition in Title 23.

- **Tips** are designed to provide user-friendly information on the range of City permitting, land use and code compliance policies and procedures you may encounter while conducting business with the City. Tips are updated by staff as needed.
- **Director's Rules (DRs)** are binding rules about land use, construction, housing, and other codes the City administers. The rules are adopted according to the administration section in the Seattle Municipal Code, including at least a 14-day public comment period.



# Tree Removal on Private Property

Updated April 8, 2024

The purpose of this Tip is to outline when a tree protected by Seattle's Tree Protection Ordinance, Seattle Municipal Code (SMC) <u>25.11</u>, may be removed, how to submit a request to Seattle Department of Construction and Inspections (SDCI) to remove a tree, and who is allowed to remove a tree. It also provides information about replacement requirements when trees are removed. This Tip is organized into the following sec-

This Tip applies to trees on privately owned undeveloped lots (vacant) and developed lots and within certain environmentally critical areas (ECA), including peat-settlement prone areas, liquefaction-prone areas, flood-prone areas, and abandoned landfills. If a tree is located within any other ECA, SMC 25.09 applies for tree protection and revegetation. Please see Tip 331B, Environmentally Critical Areas: Tree and Vegetation Overview. You can use SDCI's online map tool to see if your property has any mapped ECAs.

Please note, in most cases even if tree removal is allowed, requirements for tree replacement, using providers from SDCI's Tree Service Provider Registry, and tree public noticing still apply. Please see Tip 242C, SDCI Tree Service Provider Registry, and Tip 242D, Tree

# Permit Tree Tracking Database About the Map

This interactive map displays tree information from SDCI records that required SDCI staff approval of tree removal, tree protection, or tree planting. Not all tree activity requires prior SDCI approval, including pruning, maintenance, or certain removals in accordance with the code.

For more information on code authorized exemptions and allowances, please see Tip 242B, Tree Removal on Private Property.

You can search this map by address or SDCI record number to learn more about tree activity in your neighborhood. The data on this map represents approvals compliant with the Tree Protection Ordinance that went into effect on July 30, 2023 (SMC 25.11). Trees may be planted to comply with replacement requirements of removed trees or as part of the development standards of the zone in which the property is located.

Information on each tree allowed to be removed, or required to be protected or planted, is shown by different colored shapes on the map.
