She was a private person raised in a time when you write like a man was taken as compliment. When we worshipped Science like some terrible god prayed to be delivered and we were; built bomb shelters or wished we had. crouched in classrooms for mock air drills against unseen enemies; Dr. Strangelove exhorted us to stop worrying, love what's lethal and we did. One letter (you remember letters?) from a friend in Cape Cod carried news: spraying to control those buggers (mosquitoes), birdbath filled with DDT; carcasses of songbirds, legs drawn up to breasts beaks gaping open. Threatened bees,

frogs, crickets, coyotes; rivers of death poisons to make the Borgias' hair stand on end.

No one published her articles so she strung them together in a book words true enough to harbor critics even today.
