Key Performance Targets

- Prepare annual reports on Comprehensive Plan Amendments, Neighborhood Plan implementation, and the implementation of the Citizen Participation Evaluation Recommendations.
- Co-sponsor one to two community forums with other City departments and commissions on light rail station and corridor design and transit-oriented development.
- Survey at least 50% of the City's 37 neighborhood plan stewardship groups, highlighting key accomplishments lessons learned, and needs. Report findings to the Executive, the Department of Neighborhoods, and the City Council.

Program Highlights

Monitor and advise the City on neighborhood plan implementation.

Assist and participate in neighborhood sector planning.

Participate in the development of light rail station area plans that maximize benefits to the community and meet the goals for economic development, housing, and improved transportation.

Continue the Commission's commitment to the vision of Seattle's Comprehensive Plan through the five-year review process and a focus on related policy and project activities.

Add 1.0 FTE Planning Analyst position in 2001 and 2002 to meet the added demands of the neighborhood planning processes and the development of Link Light Rail in Seattle.
