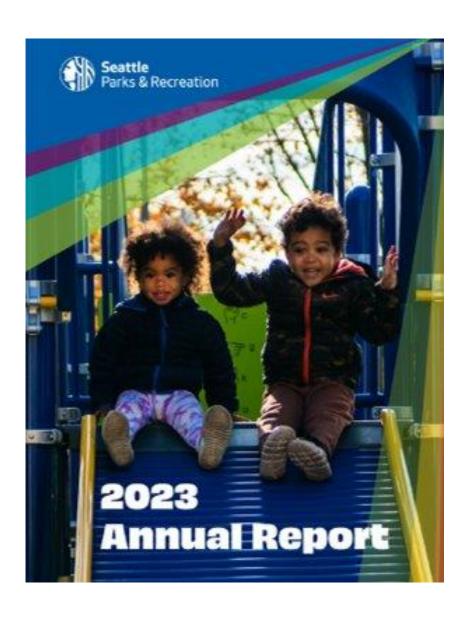

# Park Rangers

**Cycle 2 Commitment:** Re-establish the Park Ranger program to enhance safety and promote voluntary compliance of park rules.

### **2023 Accomplishments:**

- Operated most of 2023 under an agreement with SPOG that limited Ranger activity to center city parks (downtown and adjacent neighborhoods)
- Hired an initial cohort of 14 Rangers and implemented a 6-week in-house Ranger Academy
- Rangers deployed to 31 parks in 2023, to provide a uniformed presence, positive activation, and professional assistance
- 776 verbal warnings issued, primarily related to dogs off leash, use of alcohol or smoking, and park obstructions

#### 2024 Preview:

 28 Rangers onboard, now deploying citywide, with a focus on parks with more instances of vandalism, unpermitted events, off leash dogs, and other impediments to safe and welcoming park usage



# Center City Activation

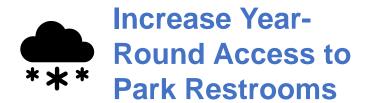
**Cycle 2 Commitments:** Expand positive activation services and staff presence through Park Concierge program, and provide resources to partners to activate 2 additional parks (Bell Street and Pioneer Park).

### **2023 Accomplishments:**

- City Hall Park re-opened June 2023 after multi-year closure.
- **Park Concierge Program** operated at 6 parks (Cal Anderson, City Hall, Denny, Freeway, Hing Hay, Pioneer) to support positive activation, provide customer service, and track maintenance issues.
  - > 21,677 hours of Park Concierge presence
  - > 5,630 activations (events, busker performances, games, etc.) coordinated by SPR or partners
  - 6 overdoses prevented with Narcan, 5 instances of CPR
- Coordinated with Sound Transit to support Buskers in transit hubs as part of the Downtown Activation Plan
- 2 new parks (Bell Street and Pioneer) activated in 2023 by DSA and Interim\*CDA using new Park District funds



### Restroom Access & Cleanliness



### Cycle 2 Commitment:

Winterize 60 restrooms currently not open year-round by 2028

#### **2023 Accomplishments:**

- √ 10 sites winterized by 2023 year-end:
  - David Rogers Park
  - Magnolia Park
  - Magnuson Sports Field
  - Lakewood Playground
  - EC Hughes Playground
  - Lincoln Park (Colman Pool)
  - Westcrest Park
  - Othello Playground
  - Delridge Community Center
  - Madrona Park



#### **Cycle 2 Commitment:**

Renovate or rebuild 27 aging restrooms by 2028

#### **2023 Accomplishments:**

- √ 6 sites in construction phase by 2023 year-end:
  - Bradner Gardens
  - Bitter Lake Playfield
  - Interbay Stadium
  - Pathways Park\*
  - Green Lake\*
  - Gas Works\*
- √ 11 new projects to be initiated in 2024





#### **Cycle 2 Commitment:**

Add 2 teams to increase evening, weekend, and non-peak maintenance

#### **2023 Accomplishments:**

- ✓ New North and South teams launched in Q2 2023
- √ 7-day coverage continues in nonpeak season to support restroom cleaning and other needed park maintenance tasks



## Decarbonization Progress

### **Accomplishments in 2023:**

- Cycle 2 Commitment: Prepare 2 Community Centers for electrification annually. Energy efficiency projects at Rainier and Miller Community Centers (LED lights, heat pumps)
- Cycle 2 Commitment: Install electric heat pumps at 4 facilities currently using oil heat by 2028. Heat
  pumps installed, underground storage tanks removed, soil samples clear of contamination at 2 facilities
  (Victory Heights Playground, Woodland Park Lawn Bowling)

### 2023 - a year of planning and scoping:



**Facility Decarbonization.** Currently assessing <u>6 sites</u> for early action (construction projected 2025/2026), and a second set of sites for later in Cycle 2.

- ✓ Decarbonization assumed for Community Centers with major renovations/rebuilds
- ✓ Includes crew quarters: upgrades required to meet goals for fleet and equipment electrification (leaf blowers)
- ✓ Seeking resources from federal and state agencies to support this work (ie FEMA)

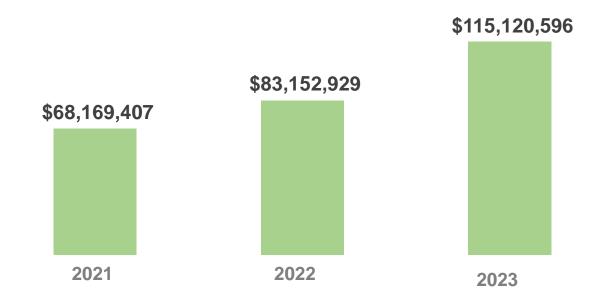


**Solar Arrays.** Assessing feasibility at multiple sites, for a Cycle 2 goal of 6 installations.



### Capital Project Delivery

- Cycle 2 included significant new resources for capital projects—many of which will require significant planning and design work, with construction assumed later in Cycle 2.
- In 2023, SPR ramped up by expanding our planning and development staff, and by exploring more efficient ways to engage community and deliver projects.
- We delivered 45 capital projects (specifics in the Annual Report), spending more of our CIP than any other year

#### **CIP Innovations**



#### **Project Delivery.**

- Working with FAS on use of accelerated methods for procurement and project development
- Strategic <u>packaging</u> of projects for efficiency, leveraging economies of scale
  - ✓ by site (ex: Hutchinson Playground)
  - ✓ by asset (ex: pool major maintenance)



#### **Public Engagement.**

- Established evidence-based framework (e.g., inform / consult / collaborate) with specific outreach approaches for each.
- Developing new map-based web information

## **Completed Capital Projects**

Projects completed across the city, across many kinds of parks and facilities, including:

- 6 play areas renovated
- 5 athletic fields resurfaced
- 8 outdoor sport courts renovated
- ADA accessibility improvements at Discovery Park, Rainier Community Center, and Magnuson Park

# Planning for the Future

Many Cycle 2 items require significant planning and design work before they are shovel ready, but we can report progress on several key priorities.

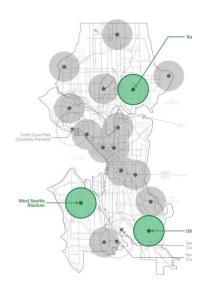
#### **Cycle 2 Commitment**



Launch an **equity fund** to support community-driven park improvement projects

#### 2023 Accomplishments + 2024 Preview

- 2023: Program model developed with significant stakeholder and BPRC engagement
- 2024: Program launched, ideas collection phase closed April 30; project selection now begins in collaboration with community



Funding to design 3 **new Off- Leash Areas** (OLA), and construct 2 (at least 1 in West Seattle)

- 2023: Completed OLA Expansion Study and related community engagement (32 parks reviewed, 4,700+ comments received)
- 2024: West Seattle Stadium and Othello Park selected for new OLAs.

*Note*: New OLAs also in development at South Park CC, Georgetown Flume, and Smith Cove.
